What's Cooking?

Almost everyone has a special dish which family or friends enjoy—why not share the recipe with our readers, be it main course, dessert or snack? Each week one will be published in this column—how about yours?

ASPARAGUS - CHICKEN SALAD

3 to 3½ cups diced cooked chicken
1½ cups diced celery
¼ cup sliced water chestnuts or toasted blanched almonds
Thick salad dressing
Salt and pepper to taste
1½ to 2 pounds fresh asparagus
3 drained canned pineapple slices
Iceberg lettuce
Stuffed olives

Combine chicken, celery and water chestnuts or almonds. Lightly mix in enough salad dressing to moisten and flavor to taste. Season as required. Cover and chill.

Break or cut asparagus tips to about 3½ inch length (use stalks for soup or for creaming). Boil in salted water until tender, drain and chill. Drain and chill pineapple.

For each salad, arrange a lettuce cup on a chilled plate. Top with a pineapple slice and divide asparagus tips among 8 salads.

Mound chicken salad on top of pineapple and asparagus and decorate with olives. Makes 8.
