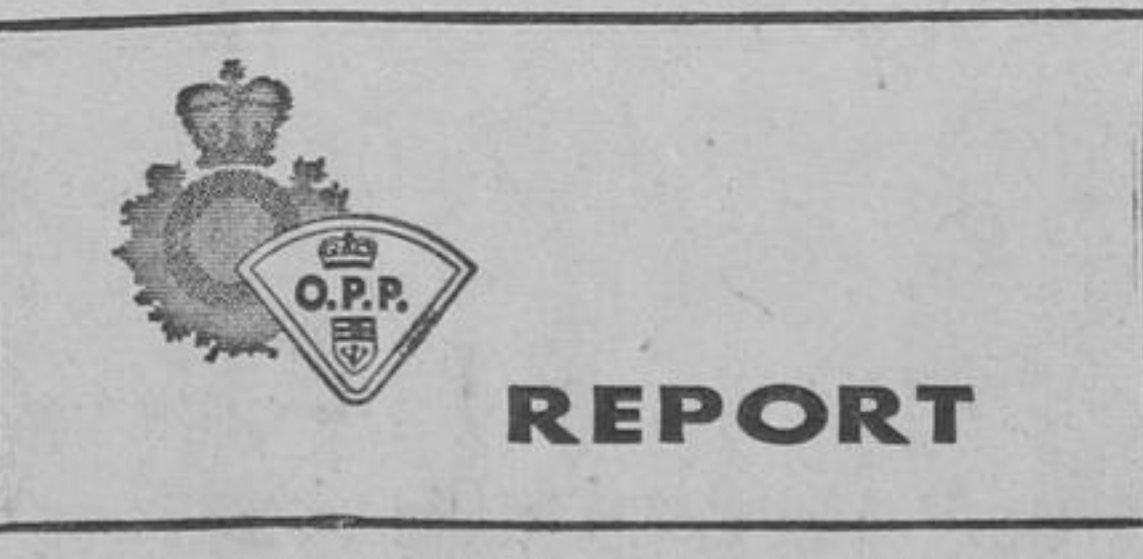

**NEWMARKET:** Newmarket residents will pay 60 cents a year instead of 50 cents for annual control in 1972. Council voted the 10 cent increase after learning in a report from its administration committee that Ontario Humane Society General Manager Tom Hughes had rejected its 55-cent per capita offer.



### OAK RIDGES DETACHMENT

#### Lady Cyclist, 20, Killed At Kleinburg By Nobleton Car

A 20-year-old female cyclist, Barbara Smith of Scarborough, was killed Saturday night when she was struck by a car on Highway 27 just south of the Kleinburg Road.  
 The accident happened at 11:15 pm.  
 Oak Ridges OPP report the cyclist was southbound on Highway 27 when she was struck by a northbound car driven by Roger Ederschlag of Nobleton Estates, Nobleton.  
 The latter vehicle had just passed another northbound car accident.  
 Provincial Constable Ian Robertson investigated the crash.

There were a total of 36 motor vehicle collisions investigated by the Oak Ridges detachment for the week ending August 26.  
 A total of 36 persons were injured, one was killed and property damage was estimated at \$19,180.  
 One person was arrested for driving while disqualified and one for impaired driving. Stolen property was estimated at \$600.

### 1,000 Signature Airport Petition Presented To Markham Council

A petition bearing more than 1,000 signatures from people throughout the Town of Markham, protesting the building of the proposed Pickering Airport, was presented to the August 22 meeting of council by Jack Foote, spokesman for the area.  
 Earlier this year, Mr. Foote and Donald Deacon MLA, York Centre, led a delegation of rate-payers to a meeting of council to speak out against the airport.  
 The petition, which was bound between cardboard covers for easier handling, will be forwarded to Prime Minister Trudeau for his review.

**LAND BOUGHT**  
 Last week, the provincial government disclosed that it had bought up about 10 percent of the land it needs for the planned city of North Pickering.  
 The government wants 25,000 acres for the expected 200,000 residents, at a cost of about \$10 million or \$4,000 an acre.  
 Harry Mitchell, who is in charge of the buying operations, said that the land acquired so far is mostly vacant or agricultural, with some houses.  
 Under a new ruling by the province, people in the North Pickering area who sell their houses to the government will be able to live in them rent-free until January 1, 1975. Then they may get the chance to buy back. The offer, however, doesn't apply to vacant land, or land larger than a building lot.

**PROVINCE WON'T HAGGLE**  
 Mr. Mitchell said more than half of the 1,200 properties have been appraised and everyone in the area will have a chance to sell by the end of the year, although provincial authorities have warned they are not prepared to haggle.  
 The province isn't planning to expropriate until it acquires all the property it can through its fee-buying appraisal.  
**ISSUING NEWSLETTER**  
 Residents of the area will soon be able to follow the government's buying through a newsletter which will be issued regularly to them for that purpose. However, the news of expropriation will appear first in the Canada Gazette.  
 Under the federal Expropriations Act, Ottawa will have 120 days after publishing in the Gazette to say whether the airport will go ahead. When that happens title to all the land passes to the government, but owners have a year to object to the price they are offered, even if they accept the money.

**AURORA:** Aurora Council has gone on record as supporting its mayor in his opposition to a recent regional council decision giving the region's planner power to bypass regional council and submit his technical reports on subdivisions directly to the province.

### Tires May Have Been Fault In Bus Mishap

A Gray Coach Lines bus that rolled over during a heavy rainstorm on Highway 400 Wednesday of last week near Newmarket will have its tires examined to see if they were in safe condition, according to Ontario Provincial Police at Oak Ridges.  
 Witnesses at the scene of the accident, which injured 25 people, said two of the bus's rear tires were almost bald.  
 The bus was travelling from Toronto to Barrie when it went out of control on a curve, rolled over and slid more than 100 feet.  
 Nine people, one in critical condition, are still in hospital.  
 Police said the investigation will probably take a week.

### Vandorf School Sold Toronto Man \$36,000

York County Board of Education announced the sale of one of its little red school houses and the impending sale of two more at its meeting Monday.  
 Trustee Morley Kinnee of Vaughan in his report, said the Vandorf School in Whitechurch had been purchased by F. J. Storimans of Toronto for \$36,000.  
 Up for sale are the Pefferlaw School in East Gwillimbury, and the Strange School in King, both built in 1915.  
 The Strange School, however, had an addition built to it in 1959.  
 Assessed value of the Pefferlaw school is \$22,700, while the Strange one is assessed at \$59,540.  
 The schools will be offered for sale by public auction September 30 to October 14.  
 Further information can be obtained by contacting the Director of Education, Sam Chapman at the board offices in Aurora.

## Contract Out Food Services For York Region Secondary Schools

York County Board of Education will contract out its food services for all but two of its secondary schools starting September 5, it was announced at a meeting of the board August 28.  
 Continuing under board operation will be the cafeterias at Markham District and Richmond Hill High Schools. At the request of the principals, King City Secondary and Sutton District High School will not be changed over until January 1, 1973.  
 The operations at Richmond Hill and Markham will be retained, so that the board can compare the two services.  
 The board said there will be no break in service for cafeteria employees, and the rate of pay will be the same.  
 The board will also remain in control of menu items, portion size, and prices and quality of food served in the schools.  
 There will be no cost or revenue to the board for the services of the catering companies. The latter will make their money from the amount of food sold at the schools. There was no public call for proposals or bids.  
 Dr. G. W. Williams and Bayview Secondary Schools will be catered to by Eastwood Food Services Limited, Thornhill, Thornlea and Langstaff Secondary Schools, and Woodbridge High School will be catered to by Beaver Food Service Associates Limited.

Trustee Mrs. Mariane Gillan told the board that Georgina had followed the practice of three northern communities of declaring a civic holiday in September, instead of August.  
 Keeping the August holiday open benefited tourists, but declaring a holiday in September — on the 18th — gave students in the area a day off that the other areas didn't get. Also, banks had to get special dispensation to close, she said.  
 Mrs. Gillan's resolution asked that schools declaring a September holiday this year be closed that date, as some people may have already made plans for the holiday, but that the councils of the municipalities in York be informed that it is not the intention of the board to close schools for similar holidays in 1973.

York County teachers will get their pay a week earlier when they go back to school in September.  
 Normally the first pay day in September is the last Friday in the month. However, as the last Friday this year is on the 29th, and as various boards are anxious to shorten the period between the June and September pay dates, it was decided to pay the teachers on September 22.  
 The change in dates will cost the board \$2,000 in interest.

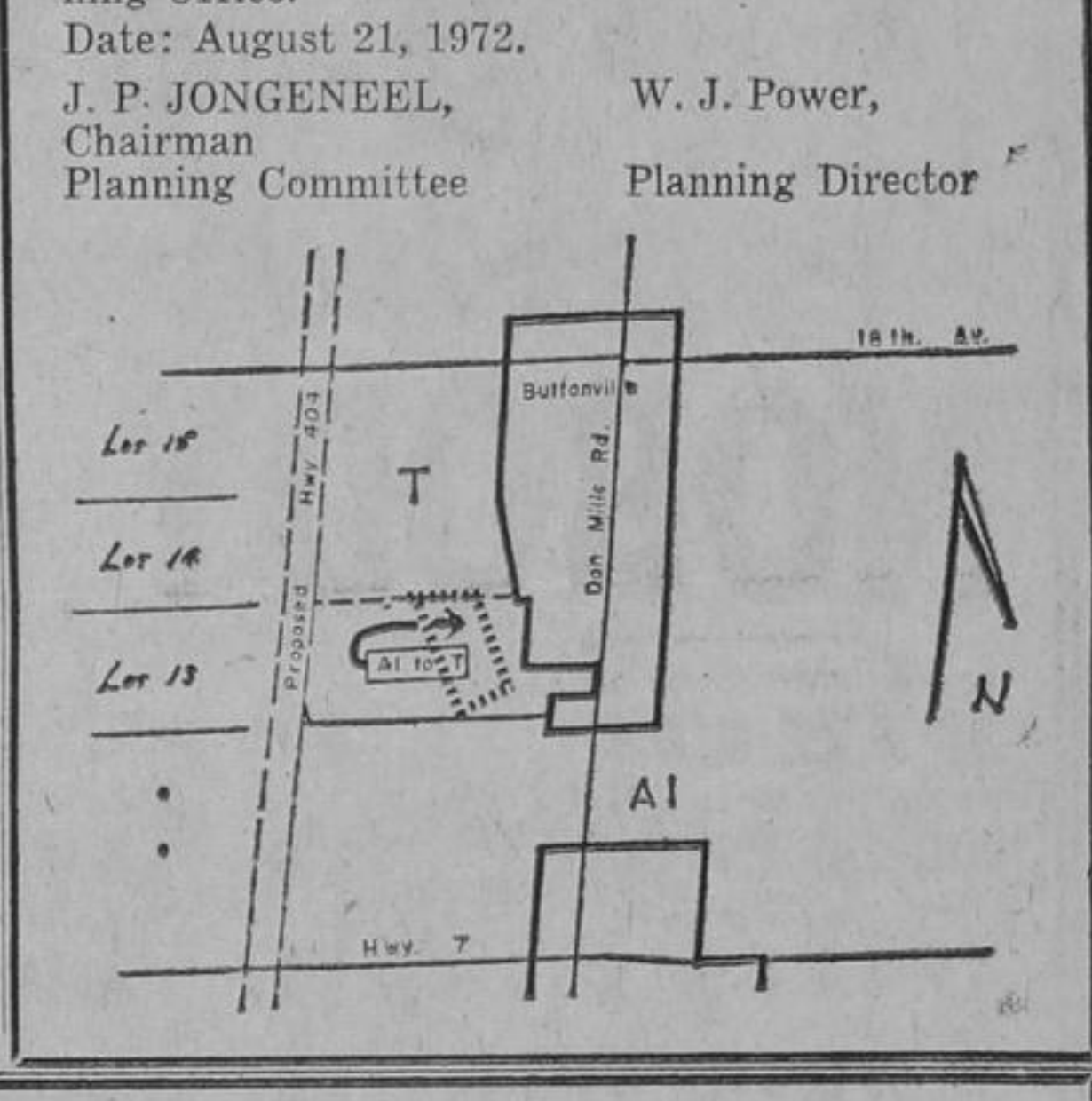
### Humber Watershed Is On Geologist's Route

A first-hand look at the Metro Conservation Authority's work will be given to 22 members of the International Geological Congress when they tour the Humber River watershed Monday.  
 The visitors, who represent countries from all around the world, will see examples of the authority's work in flood control measures, the development of parkland for recreational use and conservation education projects.  
 The group is expected to see and discuss engineering geology problems on the Humber watershed, at the Clairville Dam and reservoir and the Bolton Dam and reservoir (which is in the final design stages).  
 Tour guides will be Kenneth Higgs, director of operations and Douglas Sexsmith, engineering consultant on the Humber watershed.

**AURORA:** Aurora Council vote to contribute \$50 to the Conitox Trust Funds set up to assist the two survivors of a recent Georgian Bay boating mishap in which 10 people drowned. Councillor Illyd Harris failed to get a seconder for an amendment to boost the town donation to \$200.
