"Purdy Selected" by Alfred Wellington Purdy, published by McClelland and Stewart Limited, 1972.

The author is known to many people for his many short stories and poems which have appeared in Canadian magazines over the years. "Purdy Selected" is a collection of his best poetry, some written with the assistance of a Canada Council Grant.

A Loyalist Ontario Canadian, as he is often referred to, Purdy has captured with his pen the geography and history of Canada with deepness and feeling without becoming stuffy or documentary. His writings also speak of the modern era, evident in his poems on Che and Castro based on his visit to Cuba, Hockey I.C.B.O. winemakers, trains, hotels, John F. Kennedy, the Arctic, Havana, drunks, horses and rain are but a few of the subjects that Purdy poetically reveals.

Don't Blame King For Power Line Through Hill

The Concerned Citizens of King Township have never put any pressure on the province to have the controversial Ontario Hydro Commission power transmission line re-routed through Richmond Hill.

Making the statement was former King Township Councillor Mrs. Margaret Britnell and a member of the hydro board of the Concerned Citizens of King Committee.

She was commenting on what she termed allegations of "Richmond Hill that certain influential citizens on our committee made appeals to the province to have the line re-routed from King through Richmond Hill."

Mrs. Britnell said the concerned citizens committee dealt solely with opposing the proposed route for the hydro line through King Township.

"There could have possibly been some individual suggestions that Richmond Hill be the route. I don't know if this is the case but that's up to the individual. This committee has never advocated such a thing," she said.

Mrs. Britnell said that if "anything the only route it should take, the logical one, would be in the Toronto-Centred Regional Planning Utility Corridor along Highway 407. The exact route of this corridor has yet to be designated but many of us support this alternative method."

Mrs. Britnell was referring to a recent Richmond Hill Council meeting which saw some members maintaining that the possible decision to use Richmond Hill as a route was brought by pressure from certain influential residents of King.

Richmond Hill Councillor Lou Wainwright had commented that "he felt that undue pressure from certain influential residents in King has been brought to bear on Ontario Hydro."

"They don't care where the line goes as long as it doesn't go through King," he said.

Mr. Wainwright is an employee of Ontario Hydro.

The possible Richmond Hill route would follow the 60-foot Trans-Canada gas pipeline right-of-way south of Heart Lake, in Peel County, reaching Highway 10 north of Brampton.

After linking with the transformer station at Kleinburg it would follow the pipeline through Richmond Hill for about 12 miles, crossing Yonge Street about three quarters of a mile north of the Elgin Mills Road and merging with what hydro calls the "middle" route just north of Victoria Square.

The Richmond Hill Council has submitted a "protesting" brief in to the Solandt Commission along with Markham and Vaughan. The commission is hearing arguments both pro and con for the various routes proposed by hydro before making a final decision.

Joining in on the howls against the transmission line via briefs are King Township Council and East Gwillimbury Council.

Last week East Gwillimbury Council rushed through a last-minute resolution opposing any route through its township and sent it to the Solandt Commission.

"We don't object to the preferred route through King and across the bottom of Newmarket to the Highway 404 right-of-way," said Mayor Mrs. Gladys Rolling. "But we're very strongly opposed to the northern route."

King presented its brief to the Solandt hearing. The brief consisted of a simple resolution expressing its opposition.

"We could go on for 40 pages and it would still mean we don't want it," said Councillor Ben Routh.
