PEA SOUFFLE
4 tbsps. butter
4 tbsps. flour
1 1/2-oz. can cream of green pea soup
1 1/4 cups milk
1/2 cup grated American cheese
1 tsp. salt
Dash pepper
2 cup diced cooked chicken or other left over cooked meats
4 egg yolks, beaten
4 egg whites
Melt butter in saucepan and blend in flour. Add soup and milk; stirring until thickened. Add cheese, salt, pepper, chicken and egg yolks. Cool. Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold soup mixture into egg whites. Pour into buttered casserole; place in a pan of warm water and bake in a slow oven (300 degrees) for one hour. Serves 6.

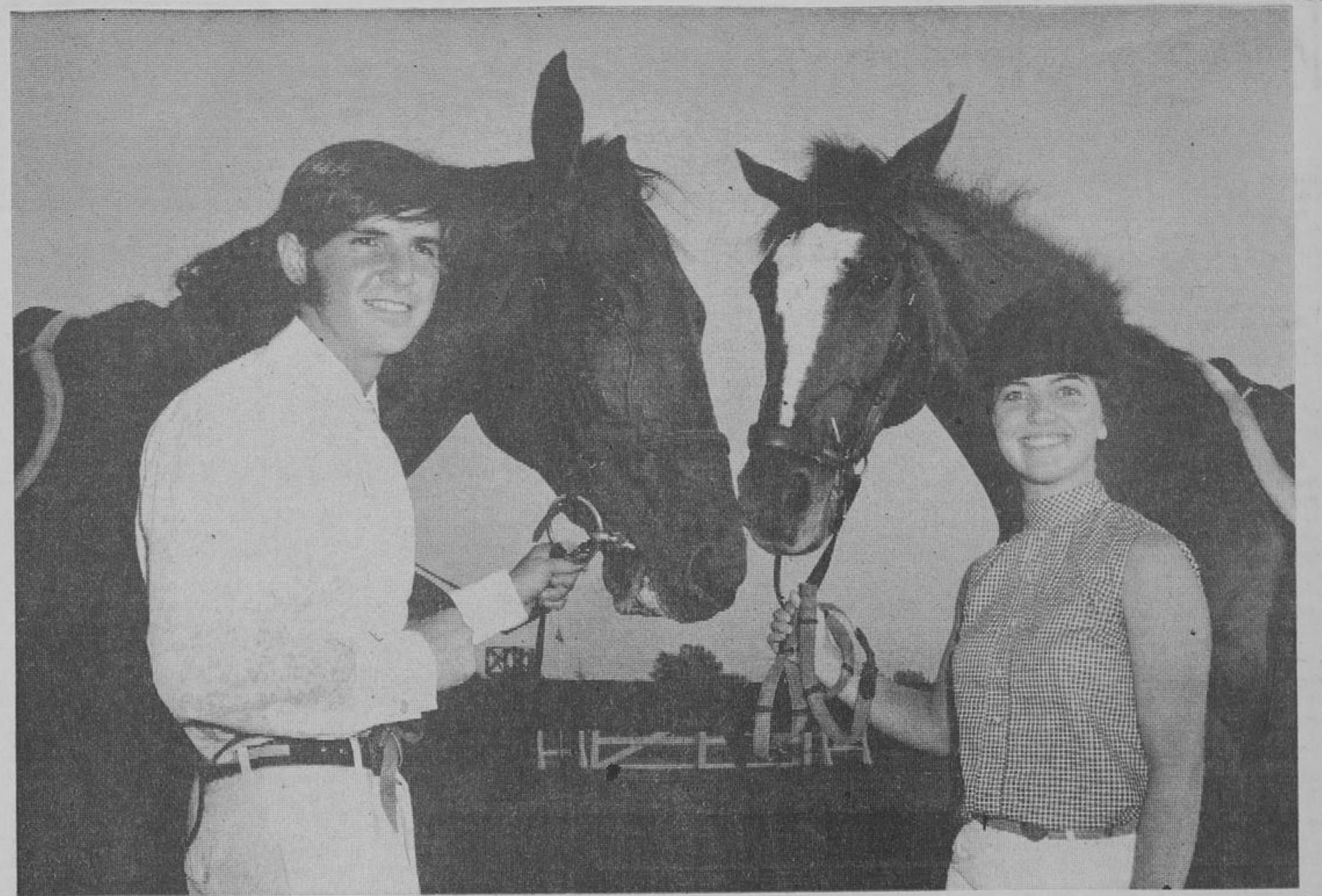

Canadian Riders Win At Ambercroft Farms

Canada's team members weren't around when the photographer showed up at the Junior International (Jumping) Horse Show at Ambercroft Farms in Richmond Hill over the weekend, but they were definitely around at the finish. For the second time since the event was inaugurated in 1968, team Canada, equestrian variety, won the Nations Cup, top prize in the three-day event. France, which won the event last year, was runner-up. The Canadian team also captured the International Class Event Saturday, its riders finishing the first, second and fourth. Members of the Canadian team were Alan Ehrlich, Toronto, chief d'equipe (coach); Nancy Southern, Calgary; Kris Lindvik, Oakville; Michel Vaillancourt, Montreal, and Scott Beech, London. Debbie Herrington, Calgary, was reserve member. Mexico finished third in the show, while the United States and Switzerland, the two other teams entered, were fourth and fifth, respectively. The show was first held in 1961, but it wasn't until 1963 that it achieved international stature when the late Lou Mikucki of Ambercroft Farms, got the idea of providing horses to visiting teams, thus opening up the show to a greater field of contestants, and giving everyone an

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
