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Hockey Costs Up, Parents Are Unhappy

A Richmond Hill father of three minor hockey playing sons is upset with the recent announced increase in registration fees for 1972-73.

Claude Henderson told "The Liberal" that "there are a lot of people who just can't afford to keep paying out more and more money each year."

Mr. Henderson, who lives at 191 Elgin Mills East, stated that "with the present increase it's going to cost me a total of \$133. All we're getting out of it is from five and a half to six hours of hockey a year not counting the playoffs and from five to seven hours practice time."

His complaints were echoed by Al Polhamus of 415 Wenlock Street in Richmond Hill.

Registration for minor hockey in Richmond Hill will be increased from \$13.50 to \$25 for the up to eight year olds

and from \$16.50 to \$30 for all older boys.

The increases were announced by RHMHA President Tom Graham who blamed rising arena costs and more hours of hockey as the prime reasons.

"I think you're going to see a decrease in hockey registration this season because people just can't afford the severe increase," said Mr. Polhamus.

Both Polhamus and Henderson felt that an across-the-board increase to \$20 would have been more in line "and adequate enough for the 1972-73 season."

"We wouldn't mind a slight increase but going up all the way to \$30 from \$16.50 is ridiculous," said Henderson.

He felt that it's time that the local hockey association applied for a subsidy from the town "the same as other organizations do. We can't expect to carry all the load

ourselves."

Henderson stated that in the past the local hockey association has been against accepting any help from the town "but our attitudes have to change in the light of continuing increases."

The two fathers were also unhappy at a RHMHA scheme whereby each parent would be given a book of tickets "which we are forced to sell or forfeit the \$10 they already charged us for. This is immoral," said Henderson.

The local association has conceived an idea whereby parents may get back \$10 on their registration fees.

Ten tickets on the association's snowmobile draw will be given for each registration fee to the hockey parent. If he sells the tickets he can pocket the money.

Henderson and Polhamus feel that a better way to achieve the objective would be

to provide tickets to the youngsters and "supply jackets to those selling a substantial number of those tickets. We don't like the idea of having our arms twisted."

They also feel that one of the reasons that more people don't turn out to the arena to watch the youngsters is that it's too cold inside the building.

"The arena people won't turn on the heat unless it's for some special occasion," said Polhamus.

Both stressed that they are not blaming the association entirely for the increases.

"I don't know too much about how the arena is operated," said Henderson, "but I think they are getting a little too extreme with the prices of their ice time. As far as I know, it's a local arena and I feel we should get a better deal on ice costs."

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
