Ray's Gulf won the St. Catharines Labor Day Ball Tournament and the \$1,000 prize that went with it. Gulfman Bill Lunney pitched all five games allowing 17 hits and striking out 51 in the 35 innings he pitched and was voted the tournament's most valuable player. Brother Rich Lunney swatted out nine hits during the tournament.

Vaughan Raps Hydro Corridor

Vaughan Mayor Garnet Williams, in a letter to the Solandt Commission studying the proposed 500 KV tower line from Ontario Hydro's Nanticoke Station to its Pickering Station, said the town planning committee would object to any proposed routing through Vaughan. However, if economic and other considerations pointed to a southerly route, then Vaughan felt the latter should be contained in the parkway corridor, as proposed in the Toronto-Centred Region Plan.

Listing the objections of the committee, Mayor Williams said the town was already a maze of bypasses and rights-of-way. The CNR bypass tracks traversed most of the town. The CNR also expropriated 1,000 acres of land for a classification yard. Highway 407, soon to be constructed across Vaughan, will require a width of 500 feet, while the existing Highway 400 slices the town in half.

The Trans-Canada pipeline travels across the entire width of Vaughan, as well as taking up some 50 acres for a compressor station. Ontario Hydro already has two major tower line rights-of-way, Mayor Williams said, "slashing north-south through Vaughan, but also taking up some 300 acres for a transformer-switching station."

The Metro Conservation Authority had purchased "huge amounts" of Vaughan along the Humber River and was buying more.

"All of these items are for purposes external to Vaughan," Mayor Williams said. "Members of the committee may be forgiven if they wonder what is next in store for Vaughan."

He said the route through the town was felt to be more aesthetically damaging than one further north. Also Vaughan residents had not been given the same opportunity as the public to the north to voice its opinion.


"We have indicated that the parkway corridor should be located as proposed from Yonge Street to Bathurst Street, but should then bend northerly between the Village of Maple and the CNR classification yards, continue westerly in the general vicinity of the sideroad between Lots 15 and 16, before bending southerly around the north and west sides of Woodbridge," the mayor said.

He said the planning committee had stressed that this was the only alternative to Hydro's choice that Vaughan might consider.


"But even then the public must be given every opportunity to express its opinion," Mayor Williams said.
