Williams, in a letter to the Solandt Commission studying the proposed 500 KV tower line from Ontario Hydro's Nanticoke Station to its Pickering Station, said the town planning committee would object to any proposed routing through Vaughan. However, if economic and other considerations pointed to a southerly route, then Vaughan felt the latter should be contained in the parkway corridor, as propos-

Listing the objections of the committee, Mayor Williams said the town was already a maze of bypasses and rights-of-way. The CNR bypass tracks traversed most of the town. The CNR also expropriated 1,000 acres of land for a classification yard. Highway 407, soon to be con-

structed across Vaughan, will


