Considerable controversy has been generated over the recent announcement by the Richmond Hill Minor Hockey Association about the increased registration rates for the 1972-73 season. The rates have been increased from \$13.50 to \$25 for the up to eight year olds and from \$16.50 to \$30 for all older






