The airport, he said, would continue to forbid large aircraft operators to use the runways although the airport was interested in permitting a new type of jet craft to use

This particular jet, he said, would cause no more noise or inconvenience than the present small craft now us-

Mr. McQuaig also pointed out that if and when the new airport was located at Pickering the Buttonville one would serve as a satellite and a longer runway would be in keeping with this role.

Opposition to the airport runway expansion was in the form of individual residents in the area who expressed

He requested that the flight path "be changed just a few feet." Mr. McQuaig indicated this was a possi-

Councillor Roy Muldrew was inclined to go along with the request of one member of the audience who suggested that council hold off doing anything until the Pickering public hearing was heard by the federal govern-

"There's a lot of pros and cons on both sides of this matter, he said, "and I can see good points for both sides. I'm inclined to think we should hold off until the federal government hearing on the Pickering Airport."

Markham Mayor Anthony Roman expressed sympathy for those residents in the area of the airport who "have a substantial investment in their property. There's a possibility that an extension of the runway could affect the value of their property even more so "by increasing the

traffic flow and the noise." He indicated council would have to give considerable thought to the positions of both the airport owners and the adjacent residents before coming to any decision.

"I don't think we will be able to come to any quick decision," he said. "It could be quite some time before we make any recommendations to council." He promised that the res-






