Dianne Diggins, a 15-year-old Thornhill lass, entered the open women's long jump and leaped away with a second place standing. Primarily training as a sprinter, Dianne has always enjoyed the long jump and showed good potential for the future in this event.

The tykes and atoms will be well represented and Ted Ruffman and Rick Buchan are expected to place well in the high jump. The bantams will have newcomer Kerri Collett entered in the sprints, Glen Belcher and Roger Wiegand in multi events, and Elnio Borin in the shotput.

Midgets expected to capture a lot of notice will be Dianne Diggins in the 400 metres and long jump, and of course, Clayton Bigelow in the distance events.

For the first time, the juvenile division will be competing in a meet with the younger members and a complete squad is expected out for this the last competition of the outdoor season. Greg Binkley, Steve Hoxey, Doug Workman, Bruce Cook, Rob Tuckerman, and Kathy Carpenter have intentions to give their all for RHAC.

The local team will be numbered in the twenties making this visit to Newmarket the largest trip to date of young athletes trained for competition.

Added glamour for the group will be the opportunity to wear their new jerseys, kelly green with white trim.

The road racing and cross-country season is already in full swing with a great number of meets planned for September, October and November. Two Richmond Hill People Hurt In Crash

Minor injuries were suffered by two Richmond Hill people in a three-car collision on Yonge Street north of the Gormley Road September 15. Injured were Pearl Gilroy, 47, 165 Colbourne Avenue, and Rachelle Gilroy, one year old, of the same address.

Mrs. Gilroy had stopped her car in the passing lane while a school bus was discharging passengers. Her vehicle was hit in the rear by a car driven by David Scott Frizzell, 23, of Keswick. His car skidded into the Gilroy vehicle and glanced off into the left rear of the school bus.

Councillors Object To Hiring Of Mayor's Nephew As Fireman

One of the three new probationary firefighters added to the Richmond Hill Fire Department this autumn will be Richard Lazenby, who has 11 years experience in firefighting in Western Canada. Mayor William Lazenby declared a conflict of interest during the discussion on this appointment at the September 11 council meeting, since the appointee is a relative.

The appointment was challenged by Councillors Lois Hincey and David Schiller. Mr. Schiller wanted to know if the positions had been advertised and was told by Councillor Lou Wainwright, chairman of council's fire, traffic, transportation and parking committee, that similar positions had been advertised last year, that 36 applications had been received, that three men had been hired at that time and the remainder of the applications kept on file. "We filled two of the three vacancies this year from those applications," he reported.

"I can't vote in favor of this," stated Mrs. Hancey. "It has been the policy of this municipality to consider volunteers first. They were for the other two men, but there were three vacancies this year and they were not advertised this year."

Regional Councillor Donald Plaxton asked if Mr. Lazenby had been recommended by the fire chief and was assured that he was.

"My decision was based on facts," stated Regional Councillor Gordon Rowe. "This gentleman has had 11 years service. We have a comparatively new force and could make good use of a man who is willing to start as a probationary. We are in dire need of training to help our force. I made this motion in committee on a practical sense, not a political one."

Councillor Stewart Bell wanted the matter referred to the personnel committee for consideration and formulation of a policy.

"Inasmuch as he has been

cleared by the fire chief and because of his years of service, I support this appointment," stated Councillor Shaun Beggs. "We are ending up with the help we need."

"I don't see any point in it going to personnel," stated Mrs. Hancey, returning to the attack. "I don't question his qualifications. I do question the fact that this job was not offered to the people of Richmond Hill or of Ontario even."

"Other persons have been hired from outside of Ontario by other committees of this council, so the precedent has already been set," said Councillor Andy Chateaufort. "In the opinion of the fire chief this applicant had far greater qualifications than others and that's good enough for me."

"My concern is that we don't have a policy regarding members of families of Councillors who might be hired," said Mr. Bell. "This might be a disadvantage to some good applicants. With a policy there would be no opportunity for people to misinterpret what this council is doing. I would hate to have any member of this council or any employee suffer from lack of such a policy."

The committee's recommendation of the appointment of Richard Lazenby was approved with Councillors Bell, Hancey and Schiller voting in opposition.

Bylaw Officer Shearn said the town council turned down last year the idea of requiring building permits for pools because such permits were considered an invasion of citizen privacy. Thus, a resident without penalty can build a pool and the town will never know in and asks about the regulations or a neighbor informs the bylaws office. But if it is unsafe he may face the cost of making it conform to regulations.

"A new bylaw is being drawn up. We hope it'll be stronger. It is proposed to include a restriction being prepared by Hydro on location of water in relation to (electric) wires," said the Markham Town bylaws officer.

Bicyclists Highway 11 And Not Highway 400

A story about the adventures of four intrepid bicyclists from Richmond Hill published in the September 7 issue of "The Liberal" had two of them returning from Algonquin Park via Highway 400.

This was not so.

The two, Ennio Borin, 14, of 52 Yongehurst Road, and Clayton Biglow, 15, of 36 Pemberton Road, returned via Highway 11. Bicycles are forbidden on Highway 400.

"There are possibly 50 such pools in the town now. We don't know they're there. They have never been checked," said Shearn. "We would like to have a permit required for construction of all pools so all of them would be on record."

CONSCIOUS OF DANGER
The bylaws officer said there were many requests for copies of the town swimming pool bylaw after the tragedy in Unionville. "It seems people are getting more conscious of the danger. A number of pools were brought to our attention in Unionville after this (tragedy) and the construction standards were checked."

"But sometimes when we try to check, the people regard it as an intrusion on private property. Most contractors find out about the bylaw, but often people building their own pools or using construction kits don't know about the (safety) regulations. Our only complaint is that we don't know about all the pools they (town residents) are putting in," said Shearn.

SOME FACE COURT
At the Foster property the open access to the house and street were bylaw violations, he said. "We have no control over pool installation at all

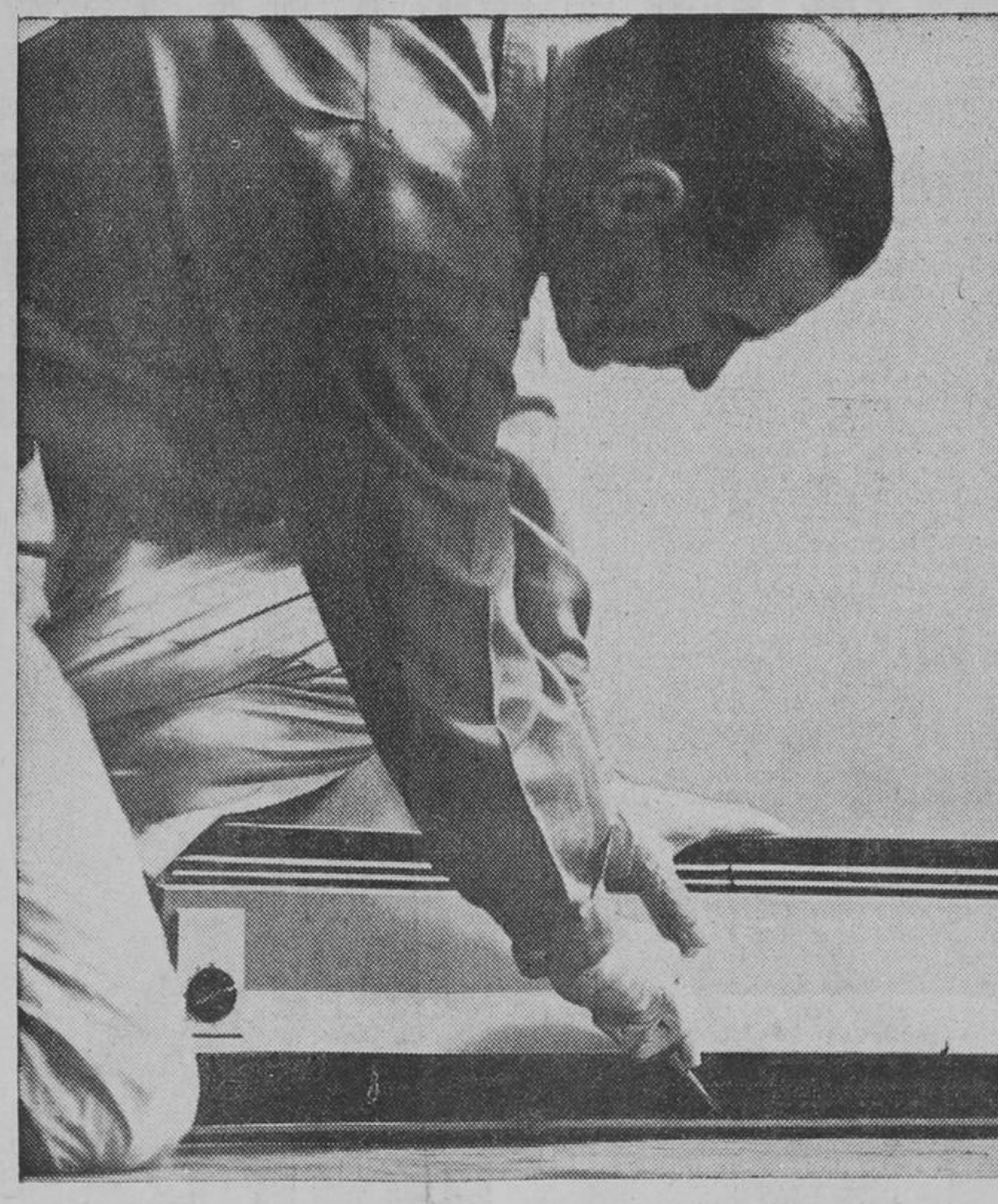
