1,000 At Opening Of King City Community Centre

Bill Curran then introduced the other special guests gathered on the stage, including Councillor Donald Findlay, QC; Norm Burling of Burling Builders Limited, Newmarket; George "Nip" Armstrong, President of KC Lions; Rev. Neville Bishop, Rector of All Saints Anglican; Father Frederick Brossler, OSA, of Sacred Heart; and Rev. Edward Smith of St. Andrew's Presbyterian. Curran made special mention of the fact that Rev. Gibson (who also officiated at the arena sod turning ceremony on March 25) will soon be leaving King City for "an even larger town" (referring to Stratford, Ontario).

Curran also paid tribute to the chairman of the opening ceremony, Burt Lutes, who was in Europe on the night of the event. Curran read a telegram from the absent chairman and also stated that only 86 lottery tickets were left.


