# Power Skating Expert For King Boys' Hockey

Youth activity oriented Nelson Whitehead, president over the vigorous executive of the KCMHA, intends that interest sparked by the new King City Community Centre will be fully exploited in increased opportunities for local hockey players.

A registration aimed at 325 boys has already reached 270 with late applicants still trickling in. A few vacancies exist for interested boys from the ages of 4 to 16 at \$21 including insurance. Late applicants should telephone Art Moore house league convener at 833-6346.

Mr. Whitehead is particularly interested in providing recreational hockey for the neglected 17 year old age group who he feels are very badly catered to, especially in smaller communities like King. Persons in this category who are still interested in playing hockey, should make a phone call to the above number for registration in the King organization.

King hockey has received 100% sponsorship for the coming season which is a great tribute to the organizers of the KCMHA and the citizens of the community. Interest generated by the new King City Community Centre has elicited an enthusiastic and generous response from local and other business interests in the form of complete sponsorship for all of King City's house leagues and OMHA teams.

Twelve house league teams covering from 7 to 17 have been made possible by the following sponsors — Graham Brothers, Kingmark Homes, King City Garage, King City Fire Dept., Stan Roots Fuel and Oil, King City IGA, Thomas Shea Real Estate, King Valley Ski Club, Rolf's Auto Service, Rockwell Maple Automotive and F. R. Custom Metal Works.

OMHA teams are being organized in the juvenile, midget, bantam, pee-wee, and novice categories, made possible by the sponsorship of Peter Boyd Chev-Olds, Kingcross Estates, Anderson Tool and Die, Sinclair Stevens, and the King City Lions, respectively.

King City Minor Hockey Association has been successful in obtaining the services of one of Canada's foremost exponents of power skating, having made arrangements for local hockey players to receive training from John Wilde.

Mr. Wilde, who is the innovator of power skating techniques, has successfully upgraded the skating abilities of several well known NHL players.

The course is being made available primarily to local boys, but there are a few limited opportunities for boys of all ages from other areas to take part. Arrangements and details of the nominal cost involved may be made by contacting Bren Salvage at 833-5907.

Formerly restricted to available ice in neighboring arenas with consequent travel problems, KCMHA is determined to upgrade the standards of hockey to be played on the ice surface of the new community centre which had its formal opening September 15. (At time of going to press, the Canadian Ice Machine Company of Toronto was putting the finishing touches to the system with the installation of the refrigeration compressors and other related equipment in the mechanical room of the arena.)
