### CHICKEN MARENGO

- 6 chicken breasts
- 1/2 cup flour
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 tbs. olive oil
- 2 tbs. butter
- 3 cloves garlic
- 1 cup dry white wine (vermouth)
- 2 tbs. cognac or brandy
- 1 cup peeled diced tomato (20 oz. tin)
- 1 bayleaf
- 1/4 tsp. marjoram
- 1/2 lb. mushrooms (in quarters)
- 2 tbs. parsley
- 1 chopped onion
- 1 tbs. tomato paste (5 oz. tin)

Dip chicken and brown in oil and butter. Add and brown mushrooms and onion. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, wine, 1 tbs. flour, bayleaf, parsley, etc. Bake in oven for 30 to 35 minutes.
