Less than one per cent of its property acquisitions are by expropriation, which means that their offers are generally higher than expropriation awards. Plans for trees and plantings were contained in their presentation to this commission. Their new policy is demonstrated on the second 500 KV line being constructed north of Kleinburg." Don Deacon, MLA York Centre, made a plea for reconsider-

ation of the parkway corridor (Highway 407) for location of these lines. "Perhaps Hydro should be looking into more lines on each tower as is done in Germany, or it could lead the world in research into underground wiring over lengthy distances. They are going to have to concentrate on finding alternatives." James McCodrum, a lawyer

Jack Ashton of Richmond Hill, who admitted he would be hurt if the southern route was chosen, said "If this is the best route in the interests of the people of Ontario then we should accept it. If we are to accept that a new group of wires is necessary for the progress of Ontario we must accept Hydro's recommendation for the best possible route. It is easy to say anywhere else but not in my backyard. Some will have to suffer in the interests of the majority of the popula-
