

Car Talk

The flat of the future won't be the dangerous or Inconvenient problem it is today, thanks to the development of a new "total mobility tire" by Dunlop. The new tire was designed to allow the motorist to continue his journey for as much as 100 miles at speeds of up to 100 miles per hour, without any major effect on vehicle stability.

The new tire owes its effectiveness to three basic factors. First, the tire bead and the wheel rim are designed so as to hold the bead in place on the wheel at all times. Secondly, the tire contains an amount of liquid lubricant. The third design feature is the relationship between the width of the tire and the rim to which it is fitted.

The stabilizing beads ensure that the tire will not dislodge if it loses air pressure due to a puncture; consequently, the tire cannot be displaced from the wheel, making it much safer in the case of high-speed deflations.
