A three-goal performance by Dave "Digger" Dunkley sparked the Richmond Hill Rams to a 9-0 swamping of North Bay Trappers Tuesday night at the town arena and into temporary possession of first place in the 12-team Provincial Junior "A" Hockey League.

It took the Rams until the 10-minute mark to break through for their first goal but after that it was a question of how many they were going to get. It was their fourth straight win without a loss this season.

Despite the score, the game was an interesting one with the Rams displaying some excellent passing combinations in a mid-season display of teamwork which left the Trappers groping in space at times.

Pat Hughes was an offensive standout for Richmond Hill scoring the first two goals and generally looking like a real find. You could almost say that for everyone else as everyone on the team came up with impressive efforts.

The other goals went to Pat Hughes, Tony Belleavance, Mike Jones, John Lumley, and Alex Pirus.

Richmond Hill outshot the visitors 40-22 in the game with goalie Gary Carr coming up with some fine saves to preserve his shutout although he wasn't really pressed to any extent on a steady basis. He was lucky on one shot which dinged off the post.

The game was a relatively quiet one except for the third period which saw the visitors become chippy and a flood of minor penalties resulted.

The Rams play host to Kingston Frontenacs Sunday night at the arena beginning at 8 pm.

In other junior hockey the Vaughan Nats, led by Rob Harris' 3 goals, whipped Kingston Frontenacs 7-2 in Kingston Tuesday night.

Bob Domik Strikes Out 24 Batters Jewellers Blank Burlington 5-0

The Richmond Hill Dynes Jewellers moved to within one game of winning the 1972 Toronto and District Major Football League Championship Tuesday night with a 5-0 win over Burlington Provisioners.

Richmond Hill's win was sparked by the brilliant one-hit hurling of Bob Domik.

Domik walked two batters while striking out 24 in the nine-inning game.

The best-of-three series could end tonight (Thursday) when the Jewellers play host to Burlington at the town park at 8:30 pm. If a third game is necessary it will be played in Burlington Friday night.

Richmond Hill won the right to enter the finals against Burlington when Oshawa Falcons defaulted their best-of-three series with Dynes.

Losing pitcher was Burlington's Hal Kemp who gave up 10 hits, walked four, while striking out eight.

Domik displayed a blazing fastball throughout the game almost impossible to touch let alone hit. The one hit off Domik came in the first inning from the bat of Hal Kemp. It was a single.

Domik has allowed only three hits in his last four games one of which has included a no-hitter. The others were one-hit games.

Dynes scored two runs in the second inning as Les Downing doubled and went to third on an error on the same play. Derek Kinnersly then singled him home. He was then sacrificed to second. Domik was walked purposely but the strategy backfired when Bob Smith's hard groundball went through second baseman's legs for an error scoring Kinnersly.

Their final three runs came in the sixth inning as Downing singled, stole second, and scored on Kinnersly's single. Gary Jodrell then singled Kinnersly to second. He then purposely walked Domik to get to Smith again. Again the strategy blew up as Smith singled Kinnersly and Jodrell.

Downing led the Dynes' batters with four for five with Kinnersly and Smith also getting two hits. Smith was credited with two rbi's.
