Joanne Coughlan and her brother Michael, aged 10, had just stepped off the school bus in front of their home when the bus lurched forward, crushing her under a front wheel, police said. Another brother Kevin, 16, was working at a vegetable stand in front of the farmhouse at the time.

Living With Tensions Topic For YWCA Six-Week Program Series

Living with your tensions will be the topic of six weekly talk and discussion programs sponsored by Richmond Hill YWCA.

Beginning Wednesday of next week, the sessions will take place from 8 to 10 pm in Don Head Secondary School on Major Mackenzie Drive in Richmond Hill.

Subjects for each evening will be discussed by professionals from York Region especially chosen for each evening's topic — personal, family, community, work situations, together with the physiological and psychological implications of tension.

The series will open next week with the topic, "Tension — Enemy or Friend?" and the speaker will be Ted Somerville, director of recreation at Seneca College.

On November 1 a panel will discuss "Coping with tension and pressure on the job and elsewhere".

Local family physician, Dr. William Bigelow, will give a doctor's view of tension on November 8.

This will be followed by ways of reducing tension through positive communication. The guest speaker for the evening, November 15, will be Fred Boden, director of Blue Hills Academy for Emotionally Disturbed Children.

On November 22 there will be discussion and demonstration of tension relief through exercise, rest and relaxation.

The series will wind up November 29 on the theme "Understanding oneself" with panel discussion and a demonstration of Yoga by local residents who have been studying with Axel Molema.

Tickets for the series of 6 are \$3, and may be purchased at the YWCA, 25 Yonge Street North, Richmond Hill, or, for those who are not able to attend all sessions, cost will be 75 cents to be paid at the door. For further information call the YWCA, 884-4811.

Craft Boutique For Christmas

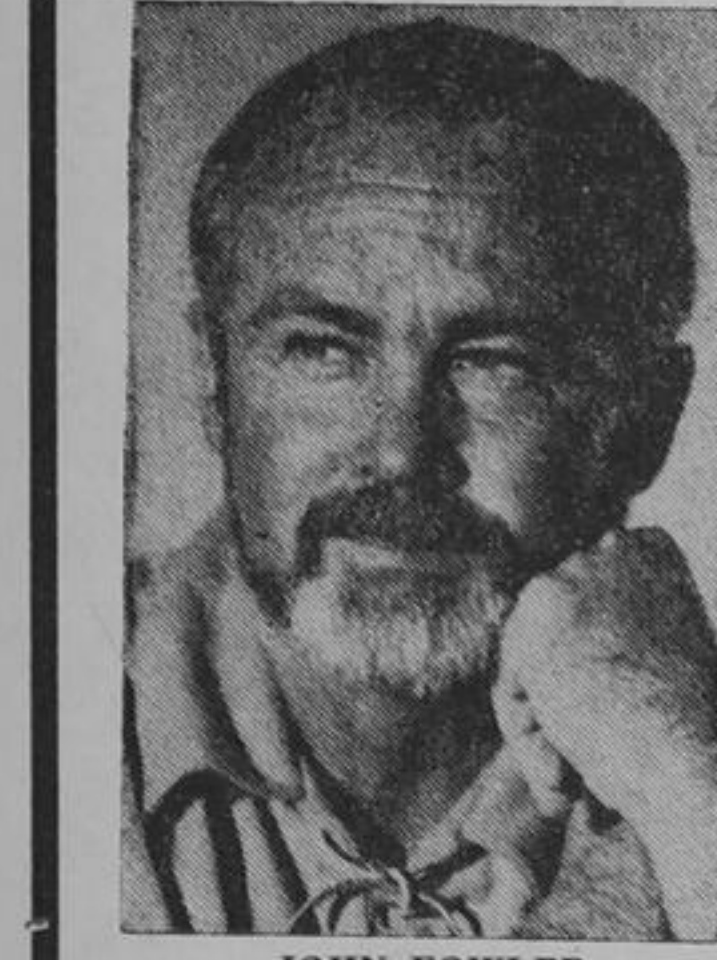
Early Christmas shoppers will find plenty to choose from at the Craft Boutique sponsored by the Rotary Anns of Willowdale.
