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French For Tots, Free Films At NY Libraries

Patrons of Willowdale Library, 5126 Yonge Street, will be happy to learn that, beginning last Sunday, the library is open to the public each Sunday from 1 to 5 pm.

Responding to public demand, the branch was opened on Sundays for the first time last fall, and proved that people do want to patronize the library on Sunday. An average of 2,000 books, records and 8mm films were checked out each afternoon.

The branch, however, will be closed on Sundays adjacent to public holidays and during the months of June to September. The audio-visual department will not be open on Sundays to circulate 16mm films.

The North York Library system is offering French lessons for pre-school children this fall at both the Willowdale and Bayview libraries. Rumanian-born Jacqueline Ogilvie, mother of two, taught French in Montreal for three years before moving to metro and during that time developed her own games for pre-schoolers and found that with the use of games, songs, riddles and general fun children's memory and retention improved as well as their French. This is the ideal age, she says, for teaching children a second language.

Classes at Bayview Library, in Bayview Village Centre at Sheppard Avenue begin Friday at 10 am and at 2 pm. There will be eight weekly sessions.

Mrs. Ogilvie will start a similar program at Willowdale Library beginning November 7. The times will be the same, but there will be just six classes and they will be held on Tuesday. They will be open to children of four and five only. For information call 225-8891.

At North York's Amesbury Park Library, 1565 Lawrence Avenue North a Scottish Night is planned for 8:30 pm Friday. It will be a free evening with long-haired lassies flinging to Highland music. The program will feature exhibitions of country dancing, the Scots' answer to square dancing, as well as music and skits performed by a Scottish group which meets regularly at the Black Creek Library under direction of Branch Head Dugold Bowers.

The Scottish Night program will be repeated October 25 at 8 pm in the Willowdale Library—free to all comers.

Since the art of making be-
