

Highest Enrolment In Separate Schools More Than 5,000 Pupil Population Now

The highest enrolment ever in Roman Catholic Schools in the Region of York was reported at the end of September. The number of pupils at that date was 5,016, it was reported at the October 17 meeting of the York County Roman Catholic School Board by Administrator Joseph Hodge.

By school closing day in June the number of pupils had crept up to 5,001 pupils from a September 1971 enrolment of 4,928. On September 5, the first day of the 1972-73 school year, enrolments totalled 4,984, but by September 30 this figure had grown to 5,016. At the end of September, 1969, the total enrolment was only 4,596.

Our Lady Help of Christians, Bayview Avenue, Richmond Hill, is still the largest school in the region, with an enrolment of 494, down 28 from June. Notre Dame in Newmarket is in

second place with 435 pupils, down 22. St. Mary Immaculate, Trayborn Drive, Richmond Hill, is third largest with an enrolment of 411, up five from the June figure, and St. Luke's, Thornhill, is in fourth place with an enrolment of 305, down 20.

The new John XXIII School, in the Unionville area, has a registration of 270.

St. Joseph's, Richmond Hill has an enrolment of 217, down five from June; St. Anthony's, Thornhill, has 201 pupils, up 32; St. Robert's, Thornhill, now has 272, down eight; St. Margaret Mary in Woodbridge had 250 pupils at the end of September, down five from June.

Our Lady of the Annunciation in Oak Ridges had 224 pupils at the end of September, down 13 from June; King Township's Holy Name had 85, down 24 and Sacred Heart had 148, up 17.

No One Turns Up For OMB Hearing

An OMB hearing at the Town of Markham municipal offices to discuss a proposed amendment to a zoning bylaw, was completed in about 60 seconds, October 19.

That's the length of time it took Municipal Board Vice-Chairman H. E. Roberts, to approve the town's application to change the bylaw to allow 23.9 acres of agricultural land in Unionville, to become available for an additional 109 lots for the erection of single family homes. Twin Towers and Associates are the developers.

The reason for the quick decision was that, despite a slew of objections earlier by residents of the area, there was no body on hand to protest at the Thursday morning session. Also several letters of withdrawal were received from the objectors.

The Official Plan for the town was adopted by council in April of 1971 and approved by the provincial government two months later.

Council approved the subdivision plan July 27, 1971, while the government approved it September 29. Council circulated the bylaw on the zoning amendment in May of this year.

Original objections were concerned mostly with the installation of adequate sewage services and an adequate water supply. Underground services have already been installed and developers are at present cutting out the streets.

Markham Solicitor James Wallace appeared for the town. No evidence was presented on either side and no reasons for the withdrawal of the objections were given.
