King City, Richvale Cars, 5 Fatal

Car accidents killed five people here in York Region during the past week.

Three people were killed in two separate accidents in King Township when the vehicles in which they were riding were in collision with the backs of two tractor trailers, York Regional Police reported.

Police also reported a double fatality in Newmarket when two children were killed. A car driven by their mother was side-swiped by a vehicle which failed to stop and sent them into the path of another vehicle.

John Clapham, 30, of

Stroud and Bruce Brown, 26, of 8 Whitman Street, Willowdale, were both killed almost instantly when the Clapham car ran into the rear of a tractor trailer on Concession 6 in King Township, south of Highway 11 Saturday at about 4:30 am. The latter vehicle was driven by Antonio Aiello of Toronto.

Robert McIlwaine, a passenger in the car, was treated for injuries at York Central Hospital.

KING CITY DEATH
In the other truck-car accident Thursday of last week John Belknap, 60, 165 Keele Street South, King City, was dead on arrival at York

Finch Hospital. Time of the accident was about 6:05 pm. According to police, the deceased was going north on Keele when he ran into the rear of a vehicle driven by Clyde Murney of Kearney, Ontario.

2 CHILDREN DIE
Killed in the Newmarket accident Wednesday of last week were Noreen, 10, and Donald, 14, children of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Berek of Holland Landing. Mrs. Berek, aged 43, was seriously hurt. Police said Mrs. Berek had picked up the children at school in Aurora and was driving north on Yonge Street about 4:30 pm when here car was struck by the hit-and-run vehicle.

RICHVALE DRIVER HURT
The collision sent the Berek vehicle into the south-bound passing lane, where it was in collision with a car driven by Alessandro Carcarella, 25, of Duncan Road, Richvale. He suffered minor injuries.

Two of his passengers, Brian Johnson, 25, of Penetang and Jocelyn Lalonde, 17, of Barrie were treated for injuries in York County Hospital in Newmarket.

Mrs. Berek, 43, is in fair condition at the hospital. Total damage was estimated at \$5,000. The accident was investigated by Provincial Constable Bob Spano.

Police are looking for a late model, maroon station wagon in connection with the accident.

KING CITY PAIR
A King City couple received minor injuries Wednesday of last week when their car was hit by two other vehicles in a five-car crash on Highway 7 west of Keele Street.

Michael and Carol Hall, aged 29 and 30, of RR 2, were stopped in the west-bound passing lane waiting to make a turn and their car was struck from behind. They were pushed into the eastbound lane where they were hit by an eastbound vehicle and further crashes followed.

Thieves Make Big Haul In Bonus Certificates

Canadian Tire Stores in the area will probably be looking for heavy spenders—in coupons, that is—for the next little while.

According to York Regional Police, a box containing \$540 in bonus coupons destined for Canadian Tire Corporation Store at 70 Yonge Street in Richmond Hill, was stolen from a CNR truck, while it was making a delivery at 250 Yonge Street North last week.

The coupons were in the following lots: 500 at 3 cents, 1,000 at 5 cents, 2,000 at 10 cents, 500 at 25 cents and 300 at 50 cents.

Biggest haul during the week, however, came in a break-in at Home Contact Limited, 60 Doncaster Road, in South Thornhill area of Markham, when thieves stole \$5,954 in electrical appliances.

Entry was gained by breaking a window. Earlier in the week, a Markham milk store manager was kidnapped in his own car and relieved of a \$2,000 night bank deposit.

Lyle Pegg told police he was forced to drive his car to the Warden Avenue subway station by a man who had been hiding in the back of his car waiting for him to leave his Becker's Milk store.

The man, who had a gun, tied him up and took his money, Pegg said.

Pegg attracted the attention of a passerby by pressing the car's four-way flasher button with his head and rocking the car back and forth.

Richmond Hill recorded a number of other varied thefts and several cases of vandalism.

Fred Skopit, 183 Forestdale Drive, Willowdale, told police that a house boat he had parked at 215 Markham Road, was heavily damaged in the amount of \$500.

He said that three windows, an inner door, the speedometer and controls were all broken. The seat and canvas roof were slashed and a depth finder was stolen.

At Harvey's Drive-Inn, 9471 Yonge Street, Richvale, two concrete garbage disposal units were damaged by vandals who drove into them with their cars.

Damage amounted to \$50. Neil Datsun Limited, 169 Yonge Street North, reported that a new Datsun, which had been parked in the lot, was damaged in the amount of \$300.

A window, tail and head lights and a fender were all smashed. About \$50 damage was done at Altana Limited, 216 Markham Road, by vandals who broke into the premises and poured printer's ink on the floor.

In a break-in at Summit Golf and Country Club, an amplifier valued at \$175, was stolen from the office.

Linda Nicol, 464 Elmwood Avenue, told police that a pair of suede winter boots had been taken from in front of her apartment while she was away all day November 17 and taken a combined diamond wedding and engagement ring valued at \$900.

Edwin Burnett, 49 Fairway Heights Boulevard, reported the loss of two rings, including a gold wedding band, taken from his home in the

early evening of November 17.

Value of the rings was \$500.

In a break-in at the home of Peter Boyd, Concession 7, King Township, a stereo and tape set, a speaker, 10 tapes and a color TV, valued at \$1,500, were taken.

Entry was gained by kicking in the front door. In Woodbridge, thieves wasted little time in attacking a car owned by Robert Martin of 7676 Kipling Avenue, after it had been in an accident at Dick Alford's Sideroad.

Martin told police that he left his car to get help following the accident and when he returned \$80 worth of tapes and deck had been stolen.

Mrs. Helen Spratt, 7049 Islington Avenue, reported the theft of \$200 in household implements, credit cards and cash, by thieves who entered her home via a basement window.

A car radio and tape deck were also taken from a car owned by Andy Kessel of Agincourt while it was parked on Second Street in Unionville November 16.
