### Hill Free Methodists Holding Conference

This Friday to Sunday is the date for the Annual Missionary Conference at the Richmond Hill Free Methodist Church, 212 Hillview Drive. The special Missionary speaker at these services will be Miss Marion Traviss, a missionary, serving in India.  
Since 1966, Marion has been carrying on an extensive ministry in the heart of rural India. One of her greatest, and most rewarding responsibilities has been that of literacy—teaching adults to read, and providing Christian materials in the local languages. Recently she took part in an exciting project—that of reaching a tribal group without a written language. An Indian national is now enrolled in a linguistics training program which will enable him to reduce the language to writing and subsequently to provide Christian literature in the Kolami language.  
The Missionary Conference, beginning Friday at 7:30 pm, will focus on the need and challenges facing Christian in touching the lives of needy people around the world. Friday night Miss Traviss will speak on the topic—"India, the Land and its People." Following the service there will be a time to get better acquainted at an informal fellowship time in the lower auditorium.  
Saturday night, Miss Traviss will speak and show slides on her area of service in India. Again on Sunday, in both the Sunday morning and Sunday evening services, Miss Traviss will speak.  
During the final service, on Sunday evening, a panel, consisting of adults and youth from the local area will question Marion concerning India, during a program called "You Were Saying."  
Marion Traviss grew up in Keswick, and is thus a native of this area, graduating from Sutton High School, and Toronto Teachers College. She invites friends from the community to come and share in this weekend of missionary emphasis.

### Illicit Drug Being Pedled Here Kills When Taken With Alcohol

Death almost struck down a 15-year-old Richmond Hill girl experimenting with illicit drugs and served alcoholic beverages at a local tavern Friday night, "The Liberal" has learned.  
The combination of alcohol and the illicit pill, a type of sleeping drug the youth call "mandrakes", attacks the breathing centre of the brain, stops breathing and causes death. The dangerous use of this alcohol-sleeping pill combination by thrill seekers has caused many deaths. It has also caused fatal accidents.  
The youngster was one of several who have been taken illegally into the tavern in recent weeks, according to the parents.  
**ILLICIT SUPPLIER**  
Police said a quantity of the illicit sleeping pills is known to have come into the local area recently.  
The youngster arrived home late in the middle of the night and could well have died in her sleep if not confronted by her parents on arrival and prevented from going to bed. While a friend was being transported home by the girl's father, the youngster in an extremely unsettled condition escaped from the home and walked to the nearby residence of an acquaintance.  
**FOUND UNCONSCIOUS**  
Called by the friend, the parents found the 15-year-old there unconscious and took her to York Central Hospital where her stomach was pumped and she responded to treatment. She was recovering in hospital at press time.  
A young Metro man was reported recovering in Sunnybrook Hospital from taking the pills in the same group after escaping from York Central Hospital emergency in a wild uncontrolled condition after being taken there unconscious.

### Remembrance Day

Friday, November 10, three grade 3 classes of Beverly Acres Public School, 283 Neal Drive, Richmond Hill, visited the Cenotaph in front of McConaghy Public School on Yonge Street, which commemorates the sacrifice of those from this municipality who gave their lives in World Wars I and II.

### Reconsider Coverage Former Trustee Ward 4 Candidate School Volunteers

York County Board of Education last week turned down a staff recommendation that volunteer workers in the schools not be provided with accident insurance, and asking the staff to take another look.  
The board, however, agreed to include volunteers in its liability insurance coverage at an annual cost of \$97.  
Trustee Thomas Johnston of Keswick said he thought the board had a moral obligation to insure the volunteers. "I wonder why the staff recommended against it?" he asked.  
Sam Chapman, director of education, said that the benefits for accidents were not that great. For example, loss of both hands or feet, only pays \$2,500.  
If a person were going to be reasonably compensated, it would have to be a lot more than was indicated, Mr. Chapman said.  
"If they're injured due to the negligence of the board, they're going to be paid anyway," said Trustee John Honsberger of Markham.  
Trustee Johnston said that, if the volunteers were going to work for the board, they should be protected, and moved that recommendation be moved back to staff to see if it could get better coverage.  
There are 400 volunteers in York schools, assisting in libraries, kindergartens and on field trips.

With a well organized company operating with maximum efficiency, Mr. Stephenson now has the time available to devote to the community, and among other things is concerned about the progress of the restoration of the Mill Pond and hopes to be able to be in the position to expedite this vital service to our town.  
He is also concerned about the slow progress of traffic through town, because of the recently installed stoplights.  
Richmond Hill is one of the largest potential growth areas in Canada, and Mr. Stephenson feels he is capable of providing intelligent business-like planning.

Fluorescent-dyed fabrics which give bright, vivid colors are subject to complete or partial loss in dry cleaning. These dyes are made of translucent substances that glow or fluoresce when the invisible ultra-violet light of daylight contacts them. They are very sensitive and can bleed or change color from conditions or normal wear.  
One reputable ladies' wear retailer had to make a complete change in their display window after only two hours of exposure to light; the fluorescent-dyed garments had faded and yellowed so badly.  
Manufacturers have corrected most of these problems to the point where dry cleaners no longer consider them a serious problem.  
Many beautiful fabrics, however, lack durability and should be purchased only if the customer has a large wardrobe and is aware of their limitations. Consult your dry cleaners on any clothing problem. Remember he is your clothes' best friend!
