



SOME FABRICS PRESENTING PROBLEMS IN DRY CLEANING

Fluorescent-dyed fabrics which give bright, vivid colors are subject to complete or partial loss in dry cleaning. These dyes are made of translucent substances that glow or fluoresce when the invisible ultra-violet light of daylight contacts them. They are very sensitive and can bleed or change color from conditions or normal wear. One reputable ladies' wear retailer had to make a

complete change in their display window after only two hours of exposure to light; the fluorescent-dyed garments had faded and yellowed so badly. Manufacturers have corrected most of these problems

to the point where dry cleaners no longer consider them a serious problem. Many beautiful fabrics, however, lack durability and should be purchased only if the customer has a large wardrobe and is aware of their limitations. Consult your dry cleaners on any clothing problem. Remem-
