Thieves Busy At Doublerink

Parking Lot Popular Place

The parking lot at Double-rink Arenas, Jane Street and Highway 7 in Vaughan, proved to be a popular spot for area thieves during the week with three thefts reported to York Regional Police.

Douglas Bridge, 345 Crosby Avenue, Richmond Hill, said that while his car was parked at the arena lot between the night of November 23 and the morning of November 24, someone entered it by slashing the convertible roof, and stole a tape deck, 8 tapes and an FM tuner.

Total value was \$200.

William Robb of Toronto reported the loss of \$150 worth of goods from his car, November 23.

Taken were a tape deck, some baby's clothing and a pair of blue jeans.

James Laverty of Cooksville, told police that on November 24, someone forced the no-draft window in his car and stole five new hockey sticks, valued at \$25.

Ross Jolliffe

County Board Chairman Seeks Re-election In Vaughan

Ross Jolliffe, chairman of York County Board of Education, is seeking re-election for another two-year term to represent the Town of Vaughan.

A trustee for the past 10 years, Jolliffe spent six years as a member of the former Vaughan Township Board and was elected to the county board when it came into being four years ago.

His reason for seeking re-election is primarily to ensure continuity in the board's operation. Four of the present trustees are retiring and, due to population redistribution, the board will have two additional members in January, making a total of 20 trustees. This means a minimum of six new trustees — nearly a one third turnover in the board.

"It takes nearly a full two-year term for a new trustee to become familiar with all aspects of the board's operation. In order to maintain York County's strong leadership role in education in Ontario," said Jolliffe, "we need experienced trustees dedicated to further the board's aims and objectives in the county."

Jolliffe, who is 49, was born in Hamilton and educated in Toronto. On completing five years service as an officer in the Canadian Army during World War II, he studied commerce and finance at the University of Toronto. He has a broad background of experience in business and owns his own firm, located in York County and

emptying several bottles of liquor.

The owners are at present in Florida.

A resident of Thornhill for the past 17 years, Jolliffe has taken an active part in community affairs. He has four children, the eldest Karen, is teaching school in Burlington, and the youngest is in secondary school.

"I believe during the past four years we have established a climate in our schools in which we can grow," says Jolliffe. "We have worked long and hard to establish this atmosphere and I would like to have a hand in guiding this growth during the next two years."

Two public schools in Richmond Hill, Oak Ridges and Charles Howitt, 30 Pearson Avenue, reported broken windows and a total of \$50 damage.

In another break-in in Markham, Sam Louttel, 111 Wellington Street, reported the theft of various articles and some clothing valued at \$750 from his unlocked garage, November 24.

Paul Argentino, 101 Pintall Crescent, Don Mills, reported the theft of a 200-pound carth packer from a construction site on Liebeck Crescent in Unionville, November 23 or 24.

The packer is valued at \$600.

The Thornhill area of Markham was also well visited by thieves during the week.

Biggest haul came from a car owned by James Fazackerly, 20 Notty Pine Trail, while it was parked in front of his residence November 24.

Taken was a color TV set and a credit card case. Total value was \$950.

Thieves also had a party at the home of Leonard Shore, 16 Riverside Boulevard, November 24 or 25, smashing in a window, ransacking the house and then
