Sensational Criminal Career Is Dramatically Recounted

SENSATIONAL CRIMINAL THE LADY KILLER, THE LIFE OF LANDRU, THE FRENCH BLUEBEARD—by Dennis Bardens. The sensational Landru's criminal career is here dramatically told. The victims, the trial scenes and the man himself complete a picture more lurid than any fiction.

BEFORE THE AGE OF MIRACLES—by William Victor Johnston, M.D. A country doctor's life before the advent of miracle drugs. A nostalgic glimpse of what a family doctor really meant. A deep contrast from the diminishing personal interest extant.

RIVINGTON—by Phoebe Hesketh. Vibrant with color, movement and the whole human spectrum of comedy and

tragedy. Talent of a very high order.
THE STEPPED WIVES—by Ira Levin. The author of Rosemary's Baby has written a new novel that will have you casting sidelong glances of direct suspicion at those you have always thought of as your nearest and dearest.

ELLA PRICE'S JOURNAL—by Dorothy Bryant. A middle-aged housewife takes an English course at a nearby junior college in order to escape from her flippant, unsympathetic daughter and her patronizing husband. As a result she is transformed to a resonantly alive woman.

DOING MY OWN TIME—by Richard H. Shoblad. A brilliantly imaginative criminal describes with complete candor his childhood, his crimes, his philosophy and emotions. The reaction of the reader may be quite different from the one clearly intended by the now-paroled author.

Thornhill School Selected Finalist Design Competition
 Bayview Fairways Public School, Thornhill has been selected as one of the finalists for the 1972 Design Canada Unit Masonry Award. It was reported at a recent meeting of York County Board of Education.

Some designs were submitted for competition. The award is presented to those who combine the use of unit masonry in a different way with quality of workmanship.

The school, which opened this September, was designed by Architect Eugene Janiss of Toronto. It was built to hold 11 classrooms, including a kindergarten room.

One of the unique features of the school is its library resource centre, which sits by itself between the two main areas of the school, half a flight up from the primer area and half a flight down from the upper area.

The school is located three-quarters-of-a-mile east of Bayview on John Street. Director of Education, Sam Chapman, said he felt gratified that the school was receiving some recognition. It had worked on a "fairly small" budget, but was not the "ordinary run of the mill school."

The official announcement on the award is to be made at a dinner November 15 at Hyatt House in Toronto. The report also noted that Devins Drive Public School in Aurora had been selected as one of the school designs to be featured at the Canadian Education Showplace October 26-28.
