James Jones

The days of horses and wagons hauling farm produce to Toronto were recalled recently with the passing of James Joseph Jones, Gormley, known to many as "Uncle Joe". Born at Jefferson on September 11, 1885, Mr. Jones was the son of James Jones and Ida Weir. All his life Mr. Jones farmed in the Gormley - Buttonville area and for the last few years resided in Old Gormley. He served for a number of years as a public school trustee in Whitechurch Township as it was then known and also as a road foreman when road work was done by resident farmers. Horses were used to haul the snow ploughs and much of the work was done by hand shovelling as was the maintenance work on the roads during the other seasons. In January 1916, he married Violet Lehman, who predeceased him in March, 1955. For some time, Mr. Jones had been confined to Brier Bush Hospital in Stouffville where he died New Year's Eve. Services were held at the Marshall Funeral Home, Richmond Hill, and were conducted by Rev. William Vandenberg, a lifelong friend. Interment will be later in Hulse Hill Cemetery beside Mrs. Jones.
