### Help Available For Farmers In Keeping Adequate Records

### A FEW TIPS TO REMEMBER

Ladies! If your dress has underarm perspiration shields, remove them before you have it drycleaned. Many such shields contain rubber which will deteriorate in drycleaning. This causes release of a yellowish color that could make a stubborn stain.

Perfume and fabrics don't mix. Perfume applied directly to your clothing results in dye rings, color removal, permanent stains and even a disagreeable odor upon aging in the fabric. Apply perfume behind your ears, or to your wrists where it doesn't touch your clothing.

Don't keep stains a secret. A drycleaner can remove a stubborn spot much better if he knows what caused it. Pin an explanatory note to the garment or tell the counter girl what caused the stain.

Never try to wash ball point ink with water. This will set the stain. A drycleaner can usually remove ink stains if it has not been wet with water.

Keep any hang tags that come with new clothing. Today's fabrics and blends are made in such a great variety of weaves, dyes and finishes that they sometimes create a difficult identification task. Those hang tags can be helpful to you and your drycleaner.
