Concerned citizens in the area have already volunteered their garages etc. as drop-off depots for their neighbors' convenience. High school students will pick up the recycleables at these deposts every other week. They will then be taken to a central depot for final sorting.

If the garbage goes to an open dump, it presents a danger to health, is ugly and wastes space. If it is burned it contributes to air pollution and if it is buried in sanitary landfill sites it may create soil and water pollution and give off dangerous and unpleasant gases.

I believe it is about 25 years before landfill sites which have been filled with garbage may legally be used for the purposes, ie, parks, etc.


