This event is being sponsored by the Victoria Square Lions Club. Give them your support!

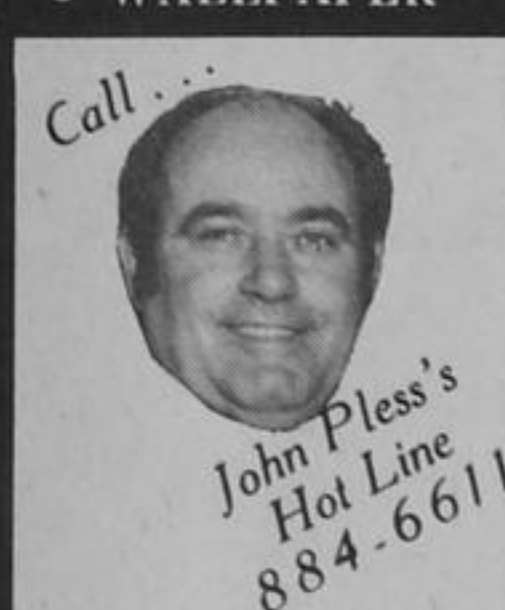
Neighborhood Notes

According to findings, noise would be "slightly" more significant than airport statistics would indicate—and most significant at the end of the north-west runway extending over into Richmond Hill. It is also expected that traffic on the northeast runway would increase due to a greater number of twin-engine aircraft at the field, although it is felt this could be restricted.
