



EXPLANATORY NOTE FOR BY-LAW NO. 66-71 The lands affected by this by-law are all of the lands within the Town of Richmond Hill except those lands which were formerly part of the Townships of King, Markham, Vaughan and Whitchurch and annexed to the Town of Richmond Hill as of January 1st, 1971 by the Regional Municipality of York Act, 1970. Attached to the by-law as Schedule "A" is a zoning map. In order to

ascertain the use permitted on a parcel of land reference should be made to the map to ascertain the symbol imposed on the area in which the parcel is located. A summary of the symbols and of the major uses permitted in each zone is set out below and reference should be made to the appropriate section to determine the minimum lot sizes, frontages, yards, etc. If the use is residential then reference should also be to the general provisions of Section 6. If the use is commercial then reference should also be made to the general provisions of Section 7. If the use is industrial then reference should also be made to the general
