velopment for all the golf course or none. If all the golf course were developed, the 17 acres could then be laid out as park area.

This would alleviate the existing park deficiencies in the vicinity. He admitted he is moving from his present home to a new one to the west to another part of the ward.

Evidence was then heard from a series of individual ratepayers, all against the application. First was Doliver Frederick of 221 Bayview Fairways Drive, a senior analyst with a large firm.

DESTROYING SCHOOL
Next was Mrs. Dahlia Rusinek of 71 Coral Harbor Crescent. She said she couldn't let her son ride his bicycle on Bayview Fairways Drive because of traffic. Of the school, she said, "At first we thought we had something good going, but now were very disillusioned (with the upset of overcrowding) and no longer any prospect of pre-kindergarten classes."

"The teacher must constantly adjust... the children are the ones who suffer... it's times we put aside dollar signs and started looking at the human aspects," she said.

Next witness was Murray Shiner of 65 Dawn Hill Trail, followed by Mrs. Elizabeth Ellis of 187 Bayview Fairways Drive, a teacher whose children attend the school. She said next year Bayview Fairways Public School will be housing over 500 students when it was

just now built for 350. She had an accident with a garage truck last winter on Bayview Fairways because the roadway was too narrow.

HOLIDAY HEARING
Robert Rusinek for 71 Coral Harbor, testified, followed by Angelo Capozzi of 48 Sea Island Path. Next came Arvi Mansikka of 168 Bayview Fairways Drive, a credit union manager. Next citizen witness was Rick Ellis of 187 Bayview Fairways, a systems and programming manager, also president of the ratepayers association.

He pointed out it was difficult for all the ratepayers to get out to the hearings in the middle of the day in mid-summer. He estimated 50% of the residents were away on holidays. He emphasized neighborhood opposition to the application was almost unanimous.

Last citizen witness was Mrs. Carmina Filice of 185 Bayview Fairways Drive, whose objections were similar to those of most other residents, namely heavier traffic on limited street facilities, overcrowding of the school and open space shortage.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO EXPROPRIATE LAND

- NOTES:
- The Expropriations Act provides that, (a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Minister of Justice and Attorney General;
 - the inquiry officer, (i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and (ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.
 - "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the act as follows: "owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested; "registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;
 - The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
