Jewellers Win Final Opener By 9-1 Over Winston Park

Richmond Hill Dynes Jewellers made it look awfully easy Tuesday night as they whopped Winston Park Caterers 9-1 in the first of their Toronto and District Major Fastball League best-of-three finals.

Second and possibly last game is slated for tonight (Thursday) at the town park at 8:30 pm.

The Jewellers drove out 10 hits including a homerun by George Teasdale enroute to the win.

Dynes' hurler Wally Dick had little trouble in going the nine-inning route allowing four hits while striking out eight batters. Losing pitcher was starter Clive Gregory for Winston Park.

Richmond Hill Catcher Bob

Shelston led the hit parade with three hits in four trips to the plate including five runs - batted - in. He was followed by Dave Russell who knocked home three.

The game was scoreless until the fourth inning when the Jewellers broke through for four big ones.

Bob Smith started it off with a single, went to second on a throwing error, and came home on Russell's double.

Shelston then doubled Russell in and also scored as Teasdale drove out a homerun on the first pitch.

Winston Park got its only run in the bottom half of the same inning as they loaded the bases on two singles and a walk. Dick got the next two batters on a fielder's choice but then walked Bob Bodkin

to force in a run. He then got Keith Warling to ground out to end the inning.

The Jewellers got two more runs in the fifth as Dick singled, Derek Kinnersley walked, Dick was forced at third on a fielder's choice. Smith sacrificed runners to second and third, Russell was walked intentionally only to have Shelston drive in two runners with a single.

Richmond Hill got its final three runs in the seventh as Mickey Hancock singled and Smith and Russell were safe on errors. Shelston then came through with his third hit of the night to drive in two more. Teasdale then drove Russell in with the final run on an infield out.

It was also his third rbi of the night.

School Grant To Increase

Expenditure ceilings for boards of education will be increased by an average of 7.9 percent next year, Education Minister Thomas Wells announced recently.

The increase, said Wells, is intended to assist boards affected by inflation in providing equal opportunities for all students.

Elementary schools will receive grants of \$683 per pupil registered in 1974 — an increase of \$53, and secondary schools will be getting \$1,210 for each student registered, an increase of \$80 over the allocation for 1973. This works out to increases of 8.41 and 7.08 percent respectively.

The Minister justified provincial imposed ceilings by pointing out that between 1967 and 1970, prior to establishment of the ceilings, the per pupil expenditures for elementary and secondary students increased by 13.1 percent per year. Since ceilings came into effect in 1970 the annual rate of increase has been held at 7.5 percent.

Ceilings have made it necessary for school boards to make hard decisions, said Wells, and the vast majority of boards in the province had managed to keep within the ceilings without lowering standards and quality of education. He said the public has almost without exception supported the principle of keeping increases in educational spending under control.

Special consideration will again be given to boards faced with declining enrolments during 1974, said Wells. The ministry recognizes that such boards are faced with certain fixed costs (for example interest on debentures, maintenance of board property, etc.) which do not decrease when enrolment declines.

AURORA: Septic tanks in the proposed Elderberry Hills Subdivision on Yonge Street could possibly interfere with the town's water table, council has learned. The 100-acre subdivision on a portion of the James Elder Farm is proposed by Mustang Financial Corporation of Willowdale, of which former North York Mayor James Service is a principal.

Employment Incentive Plan Finds Work For 11 Teachers And Others

A total of 11 teachers was employed under the provincial-municipal Employment Incentive Program for 1972-73, it was reported at a meeting of York County Board of Education last week.

Total cost of the program was \$74,949, with the board receiving all but \$3,489.

The teachers were used mainly to free regular classroom teachers for remedial work with small groups of students. In addition, 14 school aides were employed to work with teachers in the classroom and to handle other duties assigned them.

Work was carried out on a new audio-visual catalogue at the film library, while the latter was categorized and annotated.

Clerical help was hired to score a variety of standardized tests for students, while a librarian catalogued and prepared 215 books for

circulation in the board's professional library.

Annotated bibliographies on the teaching of reading and early childhood education, were also prepared.

Other projects included exterior and interior painting of 18 schools by a five-man crew, and a clean-up of grounds at 11 schools by a 13-man crew.

All surplus textbooks in the system were classified and listed, with usable books made available to schools for the June textbook distribution.

A survey of school buildings was carried out, and exterior and interior measurements of 23 schools were completed, with floor and site plans drawn up on 11 of them.

A two-man crew put all desks held in storage at Lloyds School in usable condition and refinished the wooden tops of 300 of them.
