Teachers Ask Board To Back Women's Bill Of Rights

named after women? Is motherhood strictly a female role?

Are women teachers equal to men teachers?

While the first three questions are still being decided, York County Board of Education has agreed to look into the fourth one at its next meeting September 24.

And it's just likely that it will agree with the Women Teachers' Association of Ontario that merit and not sex or marital status, must always be the criterion in hiring

women in both teaching and administrative capacities.

The board thought it had recognized all that before, and the teachers' association acknowledged the fact that women had attained equality in most of the areas mentioned in its letter, but felt that, in view of the current teacher surplus, it was "worthwhile to reiterate what we regard as our basic

It then asked the board to endorse its bill of rights.

Among those rights were equality in matters of tenure, promotion and benefits, including superannuation and insur-

The women are at present restricted to \$5,000 insurance, but under the proposed new salary

NOTES:

1. The Expropriations Act provides that,

(a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Minister of Justice and Attorney General; (b) the inquiry officer,

(i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and

(ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority

to pay such costs forthwith.
2. "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the act as follows:

"owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested:

"registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
