Teachers Ask Board To Back Women's Bill Of Rights

Is Bobby Riggs a better tennis player than Billy Jean King?
Are all hurricanes justly named after women?
Is motherhood strictly a female role?
Are women teachers equal to men teachers?
While the first three questions are still being decided, York County Board of Education has agreed to look into the fourth one at its next meeting September 24.

And it's just likely that it will agree with the Women Teachers' Association of Ontario that merit and not sex or marital status, must always be the criterion in hiring

women in both teaching and administrative capacities.
The board thought it had recognized all that before, and the teachers' association acknowledged the fact that women had attained equality in most of the areas mentioned in its letter, but felt that, in view of the current teacher surplus, it was "worthwhile to reiterate what we regard as our basic rights."

It then asked the board to endorse its bill of rights.
Among those rights were equality in matters of tenure, promotion and benefits, including superannuation and insurance.

"To how many of these be-

liefs do we subscribe?" asked Trustee Donald Sim of Markham.
"Come again?" asked a trustee.
"Where do we stand on the question of sex?" Mr. Sim replied.

Acting Director of Education, Ron Hall, said that the board complied with the majority of points mentioned, but added that there could be some difference where insurance was concerned, the men getting a chance to buy double insurance.

The women are at present restricted to \$5,000 insurance, but under the proposed new salary agreement in elementary

schools, women, if the head of the house, will be allowed the same opportunity.
Trustee Craig Cribar of Newmarket said that a conversion clause allowed those who held a \$5,000 policy a chance to convert. However, if they bypassed the opportunity, they wouldn't get another one.

Trustee Robert Houghton of Richmond Hill wondered if any woman had ever qualified for a superintendent's position.

John Kippen, superintendent of operations, said that, in the four years of the board's existence, no woman had applied for a superintendent's job. Only one had applied as a principal in an elementary school.
Women had been appointed

to jobs in administration, and as branch directors.
There were three women principals in the region, Mr. Kippen said, one at Holland Landing and two in trainable retarded schools.
"Who does most of the after-four activities?" asked Trustee Margaret Coburn of King. "I have a suspicion it's not the women."

Mr. Hall said he hadn't found any difference in that field. "If teachers are committed to teaching, they do that sort of thing," he said.
On a motion by Trustee Ross Jolliffe of Vaughan the board agreed to put the teachers' request to endorse their bill of rights on the next agenda.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO EXPROPRIATE LAND

IN THE MATTER of an application by the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill for approval to expropriate lands situate in the Town of Richmond Hill and the Regional Municipality of York being part of Lot 48, Concession 1, Markham shown as Part 1 on Plan 64R2951 deposited in the Registry Office for the Registry Division for Toronto Boroughs and York South, for the purpose of enlarging the Crosby Avenue Park.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application has been made for approval to expropriate the lands situate in the Town of Richmond Hill and the Regional Municipality of York being part of Lot 48, Concession 1, Markham shown as Part 1 on Plan 64R2951 deposited in the Registry Office for the Registry Division for Toronto Boroughs and York South. Any owner of lands in respect of which notice is given who desires an inquiry into whether the taking of such land is fair, sound and reasonably necessary in the achievement of the objectives of the expropriating authority shall so notify the approving authority in writing,

(a) in the case of a registered owner, served personally or by registered mail within thirty days after he is served with the notice, or, when he is served by publication, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice;

(b) in the case of an owner who is not a registered owner, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice.

NOTES:

1. The Expropriations Act provides that,

(a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Minister of Justice and Attorney General;

(b) the inquiry officer,

(i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and

(ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.

2. "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the act as follows:
"owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested;
"registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
