# Vaughan Seeks Injunction Re Garbage

Vaughan Town's most favored or, rather, disfavored subject of waste disposal dumping had a brief airing in council Monday of last week.

Firstly, council authorized its solicitor to obtain an injunction against the Norman Goodhead operated Disposal Services to stop it from using a 40-acre site north of Maple as a waste disposal area.

The matter arose when council was informed that dumping was still being carried out on the property by Disposal Services although an agreement had been made earlier that all operations could stop by August 31 of this year.

It was pointed out that the land area - which was deeded to the municipality some two years ago by the owners - had been the subject of an agreement between Disposal Services Limited and the Town of Vaughan.

This agreement provided for the final elevations of the disposal site, the termination date, the covering of the waste ma-

terials. Disposal Services had also received a provisional certificate for a disposal site from the province's Ministry of the En-

The certificate specified that no waste would be accepted at the site after August 31 and "the site shall no longer be used for the disposal of waste." Disposal Services Limited

has appealed the deadline and it will be heard by the province's appeal board. Council's contention is that waste disposal is still being

dumped on land owned by the municipality. The injunction is intended to stop the dumping.

The question of garbage and such was also touched upon briefly when council received a letter from a group of citizens calling themselves the Woodbridge Area Recycling (WAR)

In their letter, the citizens note that their "program is an informal activity carried on by residents of the Woodbridge area as a demonstration of the viability of the concept of recycling glass, paper and met-

They point to the increasing participation of Woodbridge citizens in the recycling activity which "confirms their endorsement of the concept of recycling and thus the protection of our environment. Many of the participants have commented on the reduction of garbage produced by their households when recyclables are separ-

The letter goes on to say that the technology of recycling and processing garbage is showing substantial advances and notes that the plans for disposal of Metro Toronto's garbage takes no account of these advances.

"There seems little justification for the Town of Vaughan to support this outmoded approach by Metro Toronto and thus to be victimized.

"The Woodbridge Area Recycling group therefore strongly endorses the resolution passed by the Maple Ratepayers Association and forwarded to the Vaughan Council and the Vaughan Planning Committee opposing the dumping of Metro garbage in the Town of


