NOTICE RE: 1973 ASSESSMENT

The 1970 Assessment Roll, amended to 1973 may be inspected at the Town of Vaughan Municipal Offices, in Maple, after September 30th, 1973 during normal business hours, (8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday).

Any complaint with respect to an assessment on the assessment roll may be brought to the Assessment Review Court pursuant to Section 52 of The Assessment Act R.S.O. 1970 Chap. 32, as amended.

Notice of Complaint must be made in writing either by letter or on forms available at the Municipal Office. Any Notice of Complaint should specify the reason(s) therefor and shall be mailed by ordinary mail to the Regional Registrar named below, and, in addition, by registered mail to any person whose assessment is complained of, not later than the 31st day of October, 1973. For purposes of identification, please include name and postal address. If possible, note also the assessment roll number, the street address, concession and lot numbers, and the municipality in which the property under complaint is situate.

A 1973 assessment may be appealed although it may be identical to the 1972 ass-
