**Why Not Women Assistants Catholic School Trustee Asks**

Four male teachers were appointed assistants to the principal at the September 18 meeting of York County Roman Catholic School Board.

Ed McGuigan will fill this position at Our Lady Help of Christians and John Shesher at St. Mary Immaculate School, both in Richmond Hill. Mr. John Chyz will be the assistant at Notre Dame School in Newmarket and Joseph Milne at St. Robert's School, Thornhill.

The assistant will be released from classroom duties for one to one and a half hours a day, with the principal or the French teacher taking over the class, to conduct surveys and fill out necessary reports. The appointment is for one year and carries a special allowance of \$1,000 for "A" schools and \$800 for "B" schools per annum.

A review of this position and of the position of vice-principal will be conducted with firm recommendations being brought to the board in the not too distant future, Superintendent John Zupanic told the trustees. He recalled that two years ago, the board had six vice-principals it had inherited from the several boards which were combined in the York County RC Board, and these had become quite a cost burden. "Last year we wiped out all vice-principal positions so we could have time to re-assess the need for and the responsibilities of this position. It is

a good place for training good principal material. The position of assistant to the principal is for a different purpose."

"I don't see any woman teacher included in these appointments," commented Trustee Rev. Father Francis Robinson. "I think women should have the opportunity to be assistants, vice-principals and principals. Our schools are dedicated to the Christian faith and I think the women teachers are the ones who contribute the most in this respect. I believe they would make excellent leaders and I'm sure they are qualified. I ask that real consideration be given to our women teachers when these appointments come up."

Promising that they would be considered, Mr. Zupanic stated that competitions held by the board for these positions are open to all. "The last time we had a competition for the vice-principals, two women teachers applied, but one was not qualified. I think the separate school boards have far more lady principals than other boards."

**Temporary Sidewalk To Bayview Fairways**

The sidewalk will be partly of asphalt where permanent construction isn't possible. The town engineer was authorized to call tenders for the south side of John Street, from Bayview Avenue to the railway bridge.
