introduced Charles Labarge of Bell Canada, manager of the Newmarket area, who told the members the success story of this small company of 149 employees (in this area) who so control the economy of the area. He quoted the figure of \$1,289, 802 paid out in wages, most of which was spent in and around Newmarket, King City and Bradford.

Mr. Labarge said that there were 27,000 resident Bell customers in the Newmarket, King City and Bradford area and that most of them were happy customers. He quoted Toronto Columnist Richard Needham as saying "that there were just three institutions that seemed to know what they were doing — the Jesuits, the Mafia, and Mother Bell".

He stressed the fact that while Ontario and Quebec are Bell provinces, you can literally telephone anywhere in the world. Your telephone, he said, is used to develop personal relationships; it is an information gatherer; a consensus maker; and a multi-dimensional space enlarger. Ninety-three percent of Canadians have telephones.

Mr. Labarge listened patiently to complaints — and there were many! As a part of Bell Canada's public relations team, he excels. He said that it cost the company \$1,500 to maintain each telephone in King City and that even though our long distance bills were high, weren't we getting a bargain! I think

most members agreed they were. Even if they didn't, I doubt anyone would willingly relinquish this mainstay of the communication media.
