Children's Aid Society Seeks Foster Parents — Group Homes

More than 100 foster parents and staff members turned up at East Gwillimbury Community Centre Monday night, as the Children's Aid Society of York both staged its annual Foster Parents' Night and got Children's Aid Week (October 14-20) off to a dancing start.

Seeing that the latter was sustained was the "Nostalgia" band, which provided music following the buffet dinner.

As part of Children's Aid Week, the Society is sponsoring a TV program depicting its work, and is also making a bid now for more foster parents, especially for group homes.

Shirley Cruikshank of Kleinburg, chairman of the public relations and volunteer committee of the society, described the latter as homes taking in from four to eight teen-aged children.

While in the homes, the democratic process is followed to help the children develop their potential, with the parents assuming the role of leaders, as the children try to find themselves.

"We're not looking for surrogate fathers," Mrs. Cruikshank said.

She said that group homes prepared the children to re-enter society through a home atmosphere, rather than an institutional one, which was more costly.

She said that the children — who have emotional disturbances, and who can't be placed in foster homes because of their ages — attend regular schools while in the group homes.

Mrs. Cruikshank said that two group homes are needed in the region, but that individual applications for foster parents are required as well.

The Children's Aid Society has its headquarters at 288 Cawthra Boulevard in Newmarket.

Circulation Up In All Branches Of R.H. Library

Circulation of books from the three branches of Richmond Hill Public Library increased 13.38% in the period between January and September 1973 compared to the same period in 1972.

Library Board Chairman Ruth Biggin told members of Richmond Hill Council Monday evening.

The total (including books circulated by volunteers to shut-ins) was 215,147 (2,364 to shut-ins). In 1972 the total was 189,753.

Greatest circulation, of course, was from the main branch, located on Wright Street, which loaned 163,073 books during the eleven months compared to 142,417 in 1972.

Richvale's Branch's circulation increased from 28,491 in 1972 to 29,843 in 1971 and Wildwood Branch at Lake Wilcox circulated 22,231 volumes in 1973 and 18,845 in 1972.

Besides that 3,339 recordings, 1,194 8 mm and 2,050 mm films and 376 projectors were loaned, a decrease of 354 during the year due to a backlog of material waiting to be recatalogued and processed. All these are available from all three branches.

Extension of services has been handled without any increase in the staff of 20. Mrs. Biggin pointed out and alterations have put into active use every square inch of space in the main building. For example, the hall in the lower floor has been carpeted in a brightly figured broadloom, furnished with comfortable chairs and is used for a program for the mothers who bring their children to the weekly story hour and film showings.

School Trustees Confused As To Status Of Proposed Centre

Plans for York County Board of Education's proposed new administration building are still up in the air.

Despite a lengthy debate on the subject last week, the board still seems unsure as to whether it had agreed to build it, rent it, or just use it on long weekends.

The staff report itself, calling for the board to accept in principle the use of a modified stipulated sum, form of contract, for the design and construction of this project.

Trustee Tom Johnston of Keswick, who moved the staff recommendation, said he would like the board to "definitely state" whether it was going to lease the building from another builder, or whether it should own its own building.

Trustee MacKay said he felt it was a matter of the finance committee, of which he is chairman, to look into.

TO BUILD OR NOT TO BUILD

Mr. Hall said the first problem was to clarify whether the board was going to build.

He said the resolution passed by the board August 20 sought approval from the Ministry of Education to construct its own building.

However, a reply from J. W. Storey, acting regional director of education, stated it was necessary to receive the approval of the Ministry, but it would be to the board's advantage to submit sketch plans to the School Plant Approval Section "for the purpose of providing an objective viewpoint."

Trustee Craig Cribar of Newmarket said he didn't think he had committed himself to build it.

"Did the board rule out the possibility of a lease-back?" asked Trustee Donald Sim of Markham.

A Western Campus For Seneca College

Residents in southwestern York Region and westerly areas in North York will soon have wider scope in choosing courses of community college variety when Seneca College opens a new campus on Lawrence Avenue near Jane Street.

Confirming acquisition of the property on a long-term lease, Seneca President William Newnam stated that courses to be offered at the new location are being "especially designed to answer the needs of people in the North York and York area west of Yonge Street."

The Lawrence Campus is now open during the day and in the evening, offering courses for career development at the post-secondary level, skill training or leisure enjoyment on either a full or part-time basis throughout the year.

Courses may be taken for credit toward a Seneca diploma or simply because you're interested in a particular subject.

It is expected that a wide variety of programs will eventually become available at the new campus. At the college's Finch location, for example, over 450 different full and part-time courses are available this fall.

The special educational needs and desires of people in the northwest Metro area are to be strongly emphasized in planning programs at the Lawrence Campus, says Dean William Stoddart, college official responsible for the new location.

Associate Dean Douglas Sherker, whose office is on the new campus, will be devoting considerable time toward assessment of community needs and planning of course offerings.

Dean Sherker states he will welcome program suggestions from anyone in the community by telephone, by letter or in person. He can be contacted at the new location, 1780 Lawrence Avenue West, or by telephoning 249-3335.

Where demonstrated needs arise over the next few weeks, Dean Stoddart says programs will begin immediately. More formal course offerings will follow.

Dean Stoddart adds that persons who may be interested in staffing the new centre on full or part-time teaching assignments should also contact him as soon as possible.

At present the main offices of the board are located in a 90-year-old former school in Aurora, while various of its other services are located throughout the region.

In its five-year forecast of a year ago, the board set down \$1,700,000 for the new centre.
