At night the loons would make the scene on the lake, you'd hear the odd bear crashing around in the bush, and then the lodge owner's dog barking at him.

When we left I was to return very soon but that was 10 years ago and I'm not even sure I could find my way back again. Sometimes I wonder if I was ever there now, if it ever really

happened. What's all this got to do with fish? I don't tie against Nobleton on goals know except that when I think of fish all the above scenes pile in on me. There they are, those people, the background scene of lake and wood, the sense of getting away from it all.




#### Kings Lose 8-2


