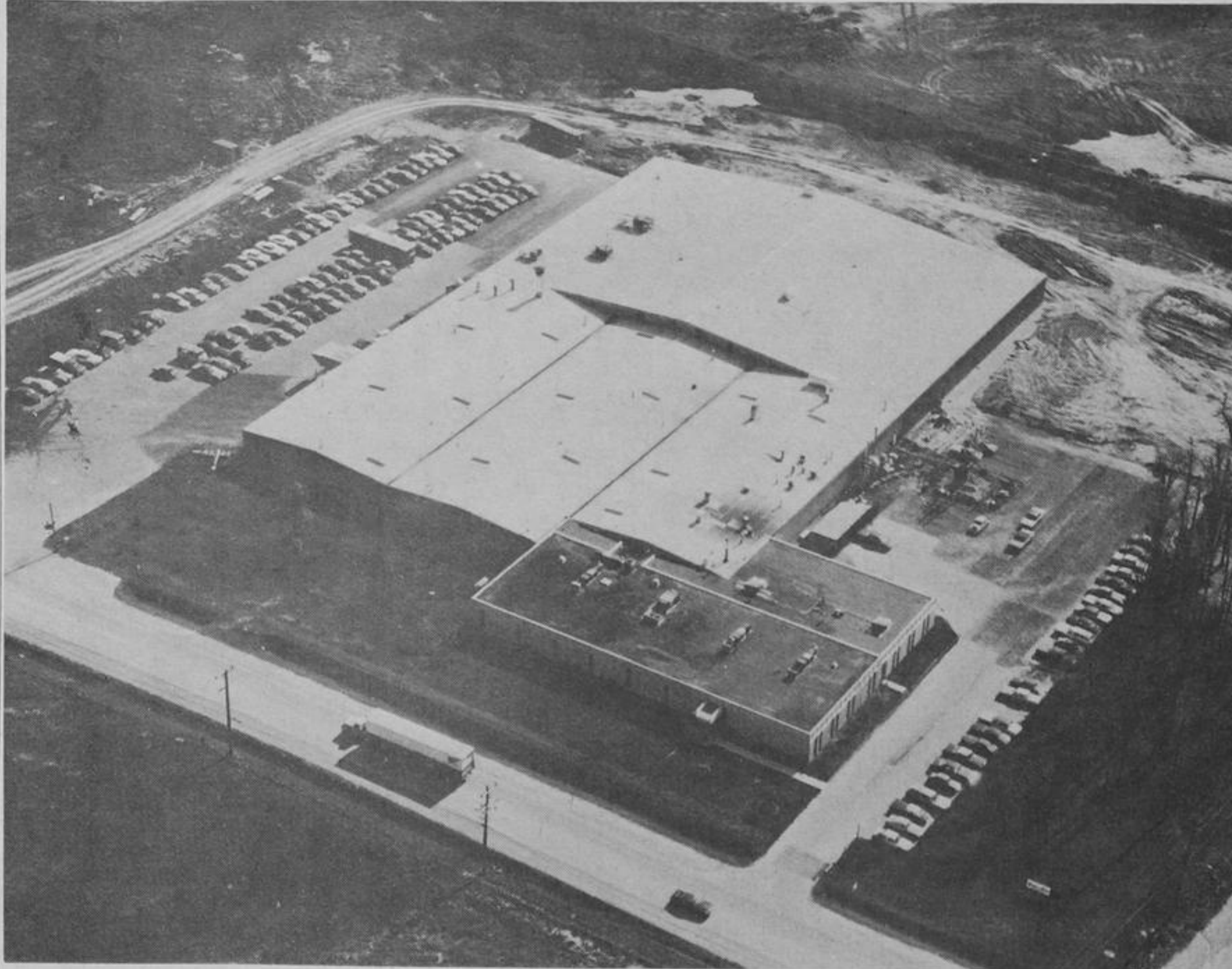
The hockey executive would like to thank all those who came out to the hockey game on Friday night and made the event so successful for the Maple clubs.

Snap-On Tools Add To Vaughan Plant

The time is not far off when Snap-on Tools of Canada, Limited, will be completely self sufficient.

Mr. Lutz, a member of the parent company in Kenosha, Wisconsin, made his remarks at a luncheon meeting and open house in connection with the official opening of the expanded facilities of the Vaughan-based company.

At present, the company, which is located on Keele Street, is identical to the U.S. operation, manufacturing to specifications, and it also occupies an independent financial position.

the Canadian company, described the plant's operations and also outlined its latest expansion.

He said the Vaughan factory was "a subsidiary of a U.S. parent, but we are treated in a grown up manner."

Mr. Bull said the plant was now so organized that additional floor space could be added just by removing a wall and adding flooring, walls and roof.

These included a vibratory grinding effluent collecting system and a water reclaiming program that had reduced water consumption by one half.

He said the company had 11 branches across Canada, including one in Edmonton, which will open at the start of the new year.

The latter was in response "to what we envisage as a rapidly-growing market for our products in northern Alberta and the North-West Territories in the years ahead."

Mr. Bull said that Snap-On moved to Vaughan seven years ago when it outgrew its East York location, where it had been for the previous 15 years.

The Canadian company itself had been founded in 1931, and now employed 300 people, 200 of them in Vaughan.

This need was further emphasized by the "demands being placed upon us by a rapidly-growing Snap-on operation in the United Kingdom," Bull said.

He said the company acted as primary supplier of products to the U.K.'s direct sales organization, and the factory now produced close to 50 percent of the total sales.

Following the luncheon, guests went on a two-hour tour of the new expansion. As a move to future expansion of the plant, the company has undertaken a landfill project, which has reclaimed acres of adjoining swampland.
