Citizen Meetings On Richvale Corridor, Modular Housing

Meetings to discuss modular housing and the Richvale-South Yonge Street planning study have been scheduled, it was reported Wednesday of last week to the Richmond Hill Citizen's Advisory Board, a group concerned with town planning and development.

The public meeting on modular housing will be held at St. Mary's Anglican Church Chapel December 10 at 8 pm under the sponsorship of the Ward 4 Ratepayers Association, Mac Langton of the association told the board.

The Citizen's Advisory Board meets December 5 at 8 pm at 377 Sugar Maple Lane to take an in-depth look at the South Yonge Street Corridor Study. The study is considered an area of vital concern for the advisory group which met at the home of Buster Vermeulin, Church and Centre Streets, Vermeulin attended the recent public meeting for the study and reported to the advisory board, which

discussed methods of bringing about public participation.

17 PEOPLE OUT

Seventeen people attended the augmented committee of the Citizen's Advisory Board, representing a fairly wide cross-section of the town. Richmond Hill and York Regional Councillor Mrs. Lois Hancey attended, responding to an invitation sent to all members of the town planning committee. The planner counsellors were asked to attend and participate on an informal basis until it is decided how the advisory group can work on a formal basis.

Marylo Graham, Janet Fayle, Wentworth Dowell and Dave Schiller presented a report on aims and purposes for the board. This statement is a consolidation of all the groups' input so far. A copy will be sent to all those who attended the first public meeting of the board October 10. These people will be asked for their further comment before the committee adopts the statement.

Pat Bedford and June Kirby outlined a possible scheme for representation on the board according to area. It proposes a board of 30 members, five for each town ward, with the wards being divided according to neighborhoods or natural communities.

OTHER LOCAL GROUPS

The meeting agreed the board should aim for this kind of representation, but for the present time should encourage all interested persons to attend meetings and vote. It was also agreed to communicate with all groups interested in town planning and development, such groups not being in the category of residential ratepayers including Chamber of Commerce, civic improvement, service club and others.

In the way of specific action for the present, the advisory board is preparing a modular housing report to the town council planning committee. This subject is being given priority because of the widespread concern about it and particularly about the current Bayview Estates modular home proposal.

The advisory board is also preparing a recommendation to the town planners on the current proposals to try to change and speed up the procedure for development and planning applications for rezoning and other approvals. The terms of this recommendation were finalized.

CITIZEN RIGHTS

Board members were concerned that the opportunities for adequate public participation and study might be lost. The recommendations are to be provided to town planning committee members before being made public.

Dave Wood and Dave Fayle reported on recent council and council planning committee meetings they attended. There was special interest in Planning Director Hesse's report ("The Liberal" page 3 November 22 edition) on the amount of current subdivision applications; the alternatives presented and rate of growth for the town will also be studied at the next meeting December 5.

For the Advent preparation festival, an Advent Wreath was hung in St. Mary's Anglican for the service last Sunday. Parishioners were urged to make a wreath for their own homes, using whatever materials, form and colors they choose. Traditional advent articles will be on sale at the church next Sunday, when the first candle of Advent will be lit. One more lighted candle will be added each Sunday up to Christmas Day when the fifth, "Christ's Candle" will complete the wreath.

The Blaney House at 111 Richmond Street made the front page of the family section of "The Toronto Star" on Monday. One of the oldest houses in Richmond Hill, it was built in 1830, and an addition added in 1860.

It was purchased by Brock and Heather Blaney about four years ago, and made an ideal setting for the family's antique furniture. Remodeling the kitchen was the largest and most costly task confronting them.
