

Teachers human, too

If contract negotiations between secondary school teachers and York County Board of Education are not settled by the end of the month, students will be getting a longer Christmas break

than they bargained for. With mass resignations now taking place, it has become apparent that present negotiations are not very

Salaries are, as is usually the case, the productive.

The first issue is the school board's key issue. ridiculously transparent attempt to manipulate the figures to their own ends. For example, a teacher who started teaching last year, who was in the lowest category, with no experience, would earn

\$7,200 under the 1972-73 salary scale. This year, the same teacher would earn \$7,650 (under the same agreement) because he or she would now have a

The board is offering that teacher year's experience. \$8,100 for this year, and claims a \$900 raise when, in fact, the raise is only \$450 because the other \$450 was rightfully

The other issue which has teachers in coming anyway. an uproar — and correctly so — is the board's insistence that it's alright to cut a person's salary whenever you want to.

If a teacher is teaching more than 50 percent of his time outside his specialty, he can be dropped a category and thus his salary is cut.

And with the way enrolment in courses can vary, this can happen at any time. The teacher can either teach another subject at lower pay or he gets The board argues that you can't pay the bum's rush.

the teacher as much because he does not have the specialization. Surely we have to rationalize this with

the need to give teachers some kind of job security. If you want to talk about paying for what you get, we'll be getting far less from a teacher who has the cloud of salary cuts or dismissal over his head year in and year out.

How can anybody teach effectively or do anything effectively for that matter - knowing they may not be able to meet the mortgage payments from one year to

The whole concept is absolutely the next.

Nobody likes taxes, And we can all preposterous. argue about salary increases, but The Banner would like to go on record as supporting the teachers in their position that you can't slice away at a person's livelihood every time there is some unpredictable allocation in course

Teachers are people. They have enrolment. families, they have expenses, the same as the rest of us. They have a right to know, that even if they may have to battle for a raise each year, at least they're not going to have their salaries cut.
