Region Family Services Seek Provincial Aid

York Region's four family service centres have the uneasy feeling that they are living on borrowed time. Will their doors be open in January or will they

Over the past year the services have survived with the aid of regional grants and fees and donations from the public after an assurance of a grant of 50 percent of cost of salaries was withdrawn by the province.

In an attempt to get the agencies back on the provincial budget estimates for 1974, Donald Deacon MLA, York Centre arranged a meeting with provincial Minister of Community and Social Services Rene Brunelle to take place at Queen's Park December 20.

Representatives from the Richmond Hill-Thornhill Family Services, Markham Family Life Centre, and family service agencies in Newmarket and Georgina were invited along with William Hodgson MLA York North and Dr. Matthew Dymond MLA for Ontario Rid-

But the planners had not consulted the department of meterology, and on the day set, the region was in the throes of its biggest blizzard of the season.

Mr. Deacon and Mr. Brunelle along with two officials from his Ministry were there, and there were representatives from

the Markham Family Life Centre, from the Newmarket agency, but the delegation from Georgina was not able to make it to Queens Park. Nor were Messrs. Hodgson and Dymond.

The Richmond Hill - Thornhill Family Services was represented by its Board Chairman Dr. Robert Alexander, Board Members William Dodds and Judge James Butler, and Executive Director Dr. Frank Fidler.

Dr. Owen Slingerland, York Region's Commissioner of Health and Social Services, and Richmond Hill's Mayor William Lazenby, chairman of the committee of health and social services started out from Newmarket, and after a 45-minute drive through the heavy storm, stopped at the mayor's Richmond Hill office for a breather. Weather reports were warning motorists against going into Metro, and the mayor had a meeting of the local council scheduled for 7 pm that evening. They had received no confirmation that the meeting with the provincial representatives was to take place, so they decided not to continue further south, the mayor said in an interview December 22.

The day after the meeting Dr. Fidler reported that the delegation had been given a sympathetic hearing with assurances that another meeting would be called early in the new year. Meanwhile, he said, all they can do is to keep hoping for the best.

When the region drew up its budget last spring it provided \$70,000 as a grant to the agencies on the understanding that this amount would be matched

by the province. However when the province's tight money budget was brought down, the family service agencies along with the hospital commission and the Ministry of Education, found themselves in a financial bind. On October 25, when all available funds had been exhausted by the agencies, the region authorized another

\$15,000 to meet salary obligations to the end of the year.

The communities they serve are expected to provide funds for office space and operating costs other than salaries. When it agreed to put up the

additional funds, regional council directed its committee to meet with Dr. Brunnelle and report back to council before December 1 with recommendations on regional funding. A number of councillors were opposed to providing further funds if the province was not prepared to share the cost.

However when the council met December 13, Mayor Lazenby said that no meeting had yet been arranged.

That same week, Mr. Deacon met with the Richmond Hill-Thornhill Family Services and set up the meeting for December 20. And in the absence of the commissioner, the committee chairman, the Georgina representatives, and two of the members of the Legislature who serve the region, the delegation made the best presentation possible.

Meanwhile the agencies are continuing to provide personal and private counselling and are carrying on with plans for a number of family life education programs to take place in the new year in the areas they serve.






