Factors In Low Cost Of Mobile Homes

Low-cost housing - what is it? In the same manner we can speak of 'low-cost food' - 'low-cost motor cars'. These are all relative terms. Considering "Terms' let us get our definitions correct. The mobile home and the travel-trailer are similar only in that both are transported to location 'on their own running gear'. The main difference between the two is that the mobile home is occupied as a permanent residence while the travel trailer is used for shorter periods, usually for recreational purposes.

Modules or modular homes are not transported on their own running gear. "Modular" and "mobile homes" terms should not be used as similar or alternative terms. The two are very different and we should be careful not to be confused by these terms. A striking example of the module (or block on block construction) was on view at Expo at Montreal in 1967 11:15 a.m.-Morning Worship and referred to at that location as Habitat. This form of factory built homes, as opposed to conventional on site construction, has many possibilities for consideration in the home building industry and might be a means of producing lower cost housing.

To avoid confusion and reduce argument, the following terms should be given eareful consideration. (a) Lower cost Housing

(b) Lower initial cash outlay

(c) Lower (and/or easier maintenance cost d) Less useable living space

Much useful and helpful information in these catagories may be obtained by consulting a booklet entitled 'Mobile Homes In Ontario-Construction And Costs'. This booklet was published (1973) by The Special Studies Section Ontario Ministry of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs. Copies may be obtained from Ontario Government Bookstore - 880 Bay Street, Toronto, or inquire at your local public library for a copy.
