ample Publicity In Fluoridation Matter If Ever Comes To Head

ample publicity will be given to the question of fluoridating the area water supply, if and when such a matter comes to a head, Gary Wright, chairman of the Regional Council, said today.

Wright was replying to a letter from Mrs. Phyllis Hawkes, 95 Roseview Ave., Richmond Hill, in which she protested a recent proposal to consider fluoridating the water supply.

Wright sent "The Liberal" a copy of his reply to Mrs. Hawkes' letter, which was also printed in "The Liberal".

In her letter, Mrs. Hawkes stated that the majority of citizens in Richmond Hill had voted against fluoridation in the past.

Should the region go ahead with its proposal, it would then supply fluoridated water to those who do not want it or pay for the removal of the fluoride, she asked.

In his reply, Mr. Wright stated that the region had only authorized an application to the provincial government for an amendment to the Regional Municipality of York Act to permit council, if it so decided, to enact a bylaw authorizing fluoridation of the regional water supply.

"At the present time there is no legislative authority for fluoridating the regional water supply and nothing further can be done until the provincial government sees fit to pass the appropriate legislative amendment," Mr. Wright wrote.

If the legislation were passed, it would give council the right to consider the matter.

If it considers the issue, it will also consider putting it to the electors for a vote, Mr. Wright said.

"If matters reach this stage ample publicity will be given to the question and all interested parties will have an opportunity of stating their views before a decision is reached," he said.

Potter Announces Crackdown On Denturists

Minister of Health Dr. Richard Potter recently made it clear in the Ontario Legislature that he intends to enforce the Denture Therapists Act (1972) which created a new profession. Denture therapists are the specialists who take impressions, fit and remake removable dentures.

After the Act was passed in 1972 the Ministry of Health made refresher courses available for practising "denturists" (the old name) and held examinations for them to qualify under the new legislation. Later a series of newspaper advertisements outlined further efforts by the government to assist persons in qualifying as denture therapists (the new name). Two sets of examinations have been held so far. More refresher courses and examinations are now underway.

Strangely enough, the Denturist Society continues to advise its members not to qualify or practise as denture therapists under the new legislation. Therefore, according to Dr. Potter, "the government has no option but to proceed immediately against individuals who continue to advertise and practise as denturists." He pointed out that the immediate future of already qualified denture therapists and registered dental technicians who are practising within the law, is in jeopardy because of the illegal practices of the denturists. "These law-abiding health workers cannot be subjected to further inconveniences because of the intransigent attitude of some individuals", Dr. Potter stated.

Pat Morley, "the bloke" who resides on Gentry Crescent and who occasionally plays as disc jockey at Branch 375 in between hockey games at the arena; advised this reporter that he would soon be meeting his brother-in-law, Bill Rosier of Pollards Hill, England, to ask him how he's not on television.

SUMMARY TO BY-LAW 73-73

The Ontario Municipal Act was recently amended to permit the Councils of all Municipalities to pass by-laws for imposing fines of not more than \$1,000.00 exclusive of costs upon every person who contravenes the by-law. Before this amendment the maximum fine was \$300.00. The purpose of By-law 73-73 is to amend all by-laws which are in force in the Town of Vaughan providing for a maximum fine of \$300.00, by increasing the fine to \$1,000.00. There are certain by-laws of the Township of Vaughan, The Village of Woodbridge and the Township of King which affect lands in the Town of Vaughan by reason of The Regional Municipality of York Act 1970, and these by-laws are similarly amended.
