Still Dump Garbage After Making Appeal

Earlier it was reported the Environmental Appeal Board ruling on November 5 and 1973 ruled Disposal Services was to cease operations by December 15, 1973 on a 6-acre site near Maple. The Board also ruled that a further 46 acres was not part of the original Certificate of approval for Dumping issued in January, 1972.

In other words, Maple could have been free from further garbage dumping by either 15 of 1973 on all land except the municipal dump.

No doubt most of you are aware that dumping has not ceased and it appears it has increased. Disposal Services trucks continue to travel through Maple and continue to dump on town-owned land.

COMPANY APPEALS
It appears Disposal Services is proceeding by appeal and other methods to ignore the apparent wishes of the community and the Environmental Board. On December

7. Disposal Services appealed the ruling of the Environmental Appeal Board to the County Court of the Judicial District of York and to the Ministry of the Environment.

So far there have been no public hearings to determine potential environmental damage as required by the act. The Court, on behalf of the Town of Vaughan, has issued a Writ of Possession for the land which the town owns and on which Disposal Services continue to dump. The Sheriff has been directed to enforce the writ which will or should have the effect of forcing Disposal Services off the land.

FIGHTING COMMITTEE
It appears the community will be involved in a continuing battle for many months to come. This can be frustrating but the M.A.D. committee has been formed for this purpose and they intend to continue their opposition to Metro's garbage being brought into Maple.

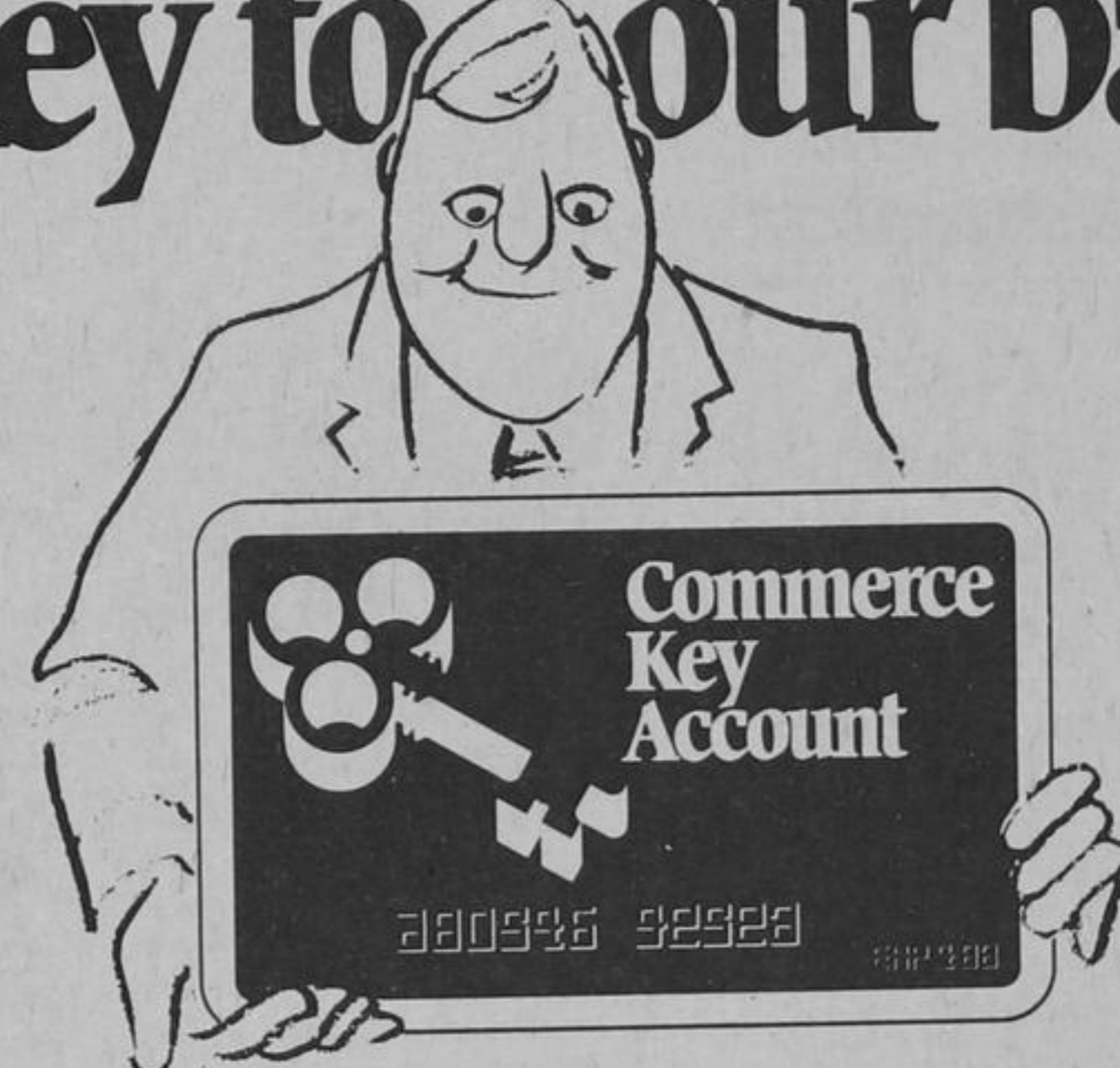
A couple from the Maple area left this week for 30 days at St. Petersburg Beach in Florida, and our only wish is that we were with them.
