Dobsons Save Life Unionville Man

A Maple couple performed a timely rescue act last week, which helped save the life of a 20-year-old Unionville man.

Provincial Police said that James and Lucille Dobson were driving along Highway 7 just east of Bayview Avenue on January 27 about 2:30 am, when they saw a car plunge over a 17-foot embankment and land in a creek 35 feet from the road. Mr. and Mrs. Dobson went to the spot and found Gary Powell, driver of the car, unconscious with his head under water. They dragged him from the vehicle and applied artificial respiration until the ambulance arrived.

Powell was taken to York Central Hospital and then transferred to Toronto General. He was said to be in "serious to critical" condition Tuesday. A passenger in the car, Carmen Stiver, 21, was taken to York Central with a dislocated hip and lacerations.

Robert Miller, 17, of Whitechurch-Stouffville, was killed January 26 at 5:25 pm when he walked into the path of a car, according to the OPP.

Police said that Robert Lapp, 44, of Markham, was southbound on Highway 48, south of Ringwood, when the youth walked into the path of the car from the west shoulder of the road.

Besides the grand prizes, awards of \$50, \$25 and \$15 were presented for first, second and third place in each of three age categories in both contests.

Robert, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kurt Frank, a grade 4 student at Joseph Gibson Public School, entered his poster, "Keep The Forests Clean", in the CNE competition. He was eight years old at the time and had almost forgotten about it when the congratulatory letter arrived from Natural Resources Minister Leo Bernier informing him that he had placed first in his category.

The 30 contestants in each of the fairs who won honorable mention received books on an outdoor theme while those in the nine to 11 age group received a one-year subscription to the "Young Naturalist" magazine as an extra bonus.

The income tax help system and how to make it work for you.

As you know by now, we changed a lot of things last year. We gave you a new return, a new Guide, several new deductions and a few new rules. And quite honestly, we were more than a little concerned about your reaction to it all. (And very, very interested in your opinions.)

Well, now that we've had time to really look back at it and assess it honestly, it appears that most taxpayers did not seem to find it too difficult. The error rate did not accelerate greatly or change drastically from former years. Generally, most taxpayers seemed to handle their new returns fairly well.

However, Income Tax will never be the easiest or most enjoyable thing in anyone's life. And it will always present problems in some areas, for some people. That's expected and understandable.

So, what we want to do now is really work with those problem areas. And the best way to do that is to work with you, individually, on whatever part of Income Tax that causes you difficulty.

And that's what April Aid is all about. It's a help system and its primary objective is to ensure that whenever or whatever you need help with, you can get it. And know how to get it.

And this is how it works:

First. Your Guide is always the best answer when you have a problem. Read it. Follow it. It not only gives explanations, but in many cases, examples of just how to figure something out.

Second. If you're still confused or something just doesn't seem to work, phone. The number of your own District Taxation Office is below and at the end of that number there are people whose only job is to help taxpayers with problems, by telephone. And on Mondays and Tuesdays phone lines are open 'til 6 p.m. So don't hesitate. If you live outside the office area, call the Operator and ask for Zenith 0-4000. She will automatically connect you to your own District Taxation Office. Remember, all calls are free, all questions are answered, and if you have queries, we want you to call.

Third. Some people prefer to talk things over in person. If you're one of them and have problems, drop by for free help. Anytime. The address of your District Taxation Office is below.

Fourth. Write. To the address below. Explain your problem as clearly as possible and include all information. (And your return address, please.) In return, we'll answer all letters as quickly and clearly as possible. Remember — if you need help, it's there. (And free.) And all you have to do is ask.
