birth control and venereal disease clinics will be operating in the Region of York. At a press conference in Newmarket Monday Associate Commissioner of Health and Social Services Dr. Ian Kerr announced that there will be a clinic at York Central Hospital, Vaughan Road, Richmond Hill, and one at the York Regional Health Newmarket.

These clinics will be staffed by doctors and community health nurses, and no one will be refused consultation or examination.

Hospital boards in the region, said Dr. Kerr, have been concerned about the number of abortions being sought and by the apparent increase in venereal disease.
