

Junior Farmers Here In York

Large Part In Lives Of Youth

For 60 years the Junior Farmers Association has played a large part in the lives of the younger members of the farming community in York County. The seeds from which this organization has developed over six decades were sown in the early days of World War I, in 1914. This was after six week short courses were held in York, Peel, Durham and Middlesex Counties. That led to the formation of Junior Farmer Improvement Associations.

Two years later Junior Women's Institutes came into being. Many of these clubs banded together as County Junior Farmer and Junior Institute Associations. But for 30 years there was no overall provincial association.

During World War II Junior Farmers felt the need for more complete organization and in 1944 a small group waited on Minister of Agriculture Thomas Kennedy. He offered \$500 to cover travelling expenses for a boy and a girl from each county to attend an organizational meeting.

An ambulance they contributed was attached to No. 1 Neurological Hospital in England and participated in the transportation of wounded on their way back from Dieppe.

**SPONSORED CONTESTS**

In addition the association continued to sponsor livestock and seed judging contests, junior plowing matches, reforestation, home beautification projects, boys' and girls' clubs and encouraged the use of services provided by the National Film Board.

They also sponsored an annual Junior Farmer Church Service at Guelph OAC, exchanged visits with the U.S.A. and Great Britain young farmer conducted leadership schools, sponsored music festivals and sports days. The Junior Farmer Song was composed and set to music by Margaret Watson of York County.

Summer camping, community surveys, conferences and public speaking and amateur entertainment competitions have also been featured.

**10TH ANNIVERSARY**

The Junior Farmer development was summed up in a report prepared on the 10th anniversary of the Ontario Association as:

"Born in the adversity of four years of World War I, developed in the vagaries of 20 years of uncertain peace with all the variations from inflation to depression, and matured in six years of the world's greatest upheaval, World War II, the Junior Farmers Association has been strengthened by experience, tempered by adversity, and has constructed a worthy foundation on which Juniors have built a mighty force for 'Self Help and Community Betterment'."

THE EXPROPRIATIONS ACT

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO EXPROPRIATE LAND

IN THE MATTER OF AN APPLICATION BY THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK FOR APPROVAL TO EXPROPRIATE LAND DESCRIBED IN SCHEDULE "A" HERETO IN THE TOWN OF VAUGHAN, THE TOWN OF RICHMOND HILL AND THE TOWNSHIP OF KING FOR THE PURPOSE OF WIDENING BATHURST STREET (REGIONAL ROAD NO. 38) FROM ELGIN MILLS ROAD TO KING ROAD.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application has been made for approval to expropriate the land described in Schedule "A" hereto. Any owner of lands in respect of which notice is given who desires an inquiry into whether the taking of such land is fair, sound and reasonably necessary in the achievement of the objectives of the expropriating authority shall so notify the approving authority in writing,

(a) in the case of a registered owner, served personally or by registered mail within thirty days after he is served with the notice, or when he is served by publication, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice;

**NOTES:**

1. The Expropriations Act provides that,

(a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Minister of Justice and Attorney General;

(b) the inquiry officer,

(i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and

(ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.

2. "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the Act as follows: "owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested; "registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
