

Lilies require fairly open, porous soil, add coarse sand and peat moss to clay. They also require lots of water, but must have good drainage. The hole for planting should be dug about one inch deep, and if the drainage is not good, 18" and put some broken stone at the bottom. Woodsy soil, and leaf mould are assets. The soil should be acid (much more acid for Imperials) with the exception of Madonna and Regal which like a little lime.

In spite of their exotic appearance and great growth, lilies only require an average amount of fertilizer. RX30 in water is good. Mulch doesn't hurt. Lilies like their lower leaves in shade. Pine needles make a good mulch for them, providing some acidity.

plans for the proposed Thornhill Public Library (Vaughan) to be located on part of Lot 29, Concession 1, on the southern projection of Brook Street. The proposed plan has been examined by members of the Town of Vaughan Library Board who suggested some modification and changes in the design, it was reported to Vaughan Town Council at its March 18 meeting.
